TAFT DEALS WITH RUSSIAN PROBLEM

No Measure That Can be Construed as Offensive Will Receive President's Approval

TWO SPECIAL MESSAGES GO TO SENATE TODAY

Will Emphasize Fact That International Relations Are Not to be Lightly Dealt With, and Will Urge More Diplomatic Procedure—Sulzer Resolution Will be Vetted if It Gets Through Senate—Russian Comment on Case.

Washington, Dec. 17.—The Russian treaty situation cleared materially today, and the administration took the opportunity to announce the substance of the treaty of 1823 with the St. Petersburg government. The Russian situation became more definitely known. President Taft, it is said, has indicated emphatically that he will not support the Sulzer resolution instantly if it is forced through the senate tomorrow without modification. Nothing that can be construed as an offense to Russia will be permitted, if the president can help it.

Special Messages to Senate. According to the programme announced tonight, Mr. Taft will send two communications to the senate tomorrow, one as regards the Russian treaty to be considered in executive session, and the other a letter directed to Chairman Cullom of the senate committee on foreign relations. In these communications it is said, Mr. Taft will outline his attitude plainly, and will call pointed attention to the fact that international relations are not lightly to be dealt with.

Will Ignore the House. Despite the advice of certain republican leaders in the house that the lower branch of congress be considered in the matter, President Taft is said tonight to be determined to ignore the house in the matter of further dealing with the Russian situation.

Russia Probably Notified. Senate leaders expect to hear tomorrow that through American Ambassador Guild at St. Petersburg the president has already notified Russia of the impending abrogation of the treaty. This notice is believed to have been couched in the politest of diplomatic language and to have stated that the American people have come to regard the treaty as obsolete in many respects. The notice is believed to be in the treaty is fixed for January 1, 1913.

Can Abrogate Treaty Himself. The president is said to have taken the ground that he has the right to abrogate the treaty by executive decree without waiting for, or taking into consideration, the senate. A Division of Opinion. There appeared to be a decided difference of opinion today between the house and senate regarding the abrogation of the treaty. Under these circumstances they point out that action by the house is essential. Senate leaders, on the other hand, maintain that treaty-breaking are matters for the senate and the president.

FOUR DESPERADOS TO BE HANGED THIS WEEK.

Youths Who Murdered Truck Farmer Won't See Christmas.

Chicago, Dec. 17.—The week before Christmas will be a busy one for Cook county. On Friday, Dec. 22, unless something unforeseen happens, four men will be hanged in the old jail. They are Fred W. Guesler, Jr., a truck farmer, on the morning of Oct. 24, who was charged with the murder of his brother Frank, 21; Philip Sommerling, 24, and Thomas Schmitt, 27, all of whom were charged with the murder of Fred W. Guesler, Jr. on the morning of Oct. 24. The four men were given life sentences by reason of their youth, being 16 years of age.

Frank Shibliwaki was a trusty in the county jail three years ago when he was charged with the murder of a woman. He was sentenced to be hanged, and aided in the erection of Shibliwaki's scaffold. He received the fatal blow when some of the others at work putting together the same scaffold, on which the four men will be hanged, could be heard in the cells above.

Never since the Haymarket riots of 1887 has so many lives been taken by the st. at one time. On Nov. 11 of that year A. W. Parsons, August Spies, Joseph Fisher and George Engel were hanged for their part in the rioting.

Tobacco Investigations. Co-operative studies with Connecticut Valley Growers.

(Special to The Bulletin.) Washington, Dec. 17.—Hon. H. T. Clegg, chief of the bureau of plant industry of the agriculture department, in his report sent to the house yesterday, has called attention to the fact that some additional problems of importance have been taken up. Experiments are being made in the more important tobacco districts of the states of Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Florida.

Co-operative studies with growers in the Connecticut valley as to the value of the light of the sun in the control of calico or the mosaic disease have been continued, as have also the studies in the control of the pest of phosphorus in increasing the yield and reducing cost in the broad leaf section. The success of the investigations in tobacco curing in this section this year is a study of the effect of the different methods of curing and other qualities of the cured leaf.
