RESERVOIR HEARINGS DUE TODAY

Two Matters Will Come Before Judge Shumway in Superior Court Room—But Little Work Being Done There Now—Second Dam Nearly Finished.

This morning there will be a hearing in the superior court room before Judge N. A. Shumway on two matters concerning the Stony Brook reservoir. The first matter to come up, it is understood, will be the motion which Mr. Palmer claims that he should not be allowed to re-argue, but now comes up for re-argument to have J. Maymond Palmer vacate his farm where the reservoir is located and for which the court has decided the city shall pay \$4,000. Counsel for Mr. Palmer claim that he should not be made to vacate the farm now, as the matter has been appealed to the supreme court. As the result of the first argument of the motion Judge Shumway was unable to reach a decision and asked the attorneys to re-argue it. The farmhouse and barn of the Palmer farm are shown in the above picture. The water of the reservoir when full, it is stated, will come up to a level with the barn floor and the water commissioners desire to remove the unbalance of having a dwelling or barn on the watershed.

The second matter to come up will be the proceeding brought by the water board to have Judge Shumway appraise the damage to C. S. Johnson, Cella R. Cook, Humphrey Galloway, Patrick Cook, Nathan Becker and Harris Halph, caused by the taking of the land for the reservoir. The evidence will be presented before Judge Shumway tending to show the damage occasioned by the taking of the land, and from the testimony Judge Shumway will fix the damage. The board has made adjustments with several property owners.

Water Board Meeting. The monthly meeting of the board of water commissioners was held on Friday afternoon with all the members present except C. E. Briggs, who was unable to be present because of illness. P. F. Bray 2d met with the board for the first time. Routine business was carried, a survey of the section only about three-quarters of an hour. It was reported that the engineer had made a survey of the watershed of Stony Brook and it is found that there remains over six square miles below the new reservoir, that the reservoir takes away from the brook but two square miles of watershed.

SUDDEN DEATH OF JOHN J. GAGER

Died from a Shock and Was Found in His Barn a Short Time After. Between 2:30 and 4 o'clock Friday afternoon John J. Gager, a prominent resident of Bozrah, died suddenly at his home as the result of a shock. Last week he had slight shock but recovered therefrom and was able to go about. On Friday he went to the barn and being gone longer than was necessary to do the errand upon which he went, a member of the family went to look him up and found him dead in the barn. Dr. W. K. Tinsley of this city was summoned and decided death was the result of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mr. Gager, who was 50 years of age, was a native of Bozrah, having been born on the place where he always lived, at Bozrah Center. He was the son of John Gager and Mary Ann Gager and was born August 14, 1831. He was one of the town's prominent citizens and was highly esteemed in his community.

Mr. Gager was a democrat and held a number of offices of trust, having been sent to the legislature to represent Bozrah in 1882-3 and he has also held the office of assessor and selectman. He being 10 to organization, but was an attendant at the Bozrah Congregational church.

His many friends will learn with sincere regret of his sudden death. He is survived by his wife and three children, Samuel A. Gager of Bozrah, George Gager of Bozrah, and Miss Lillie E. Gager of Bozrah. He leaves one brother, Charles A. Gager of Bozrah and a sister, Mrs. Roswell Fox of Westfield.
