Used Mails to Defraud

INDICTMENTS AGAINST FIVE PROMINENT CITIZENS.

EX-MAYOR OF BOSTON

Joseph Quincy Among the Accused—Julian Hawthorne, Son of Noted Novelist, Also One of the Group.

New York, Jan. 5.—On indictments, the existence of which was made public this afternoon for the first time, five men guilty were entered in the United States district court this afternoon by Julian Hawthorne, journalist-promoter, Joseph Quincy, a former assistant secretary of state, ex-mayor of Boston and at present a member of the transit commission of Boston; Albert Freeman, a promoter; John McKinnon, treasurer and secretary of the Hawthorne mining companies; and Dr. William J. Horton, a nerve specialist of this city. All are charged with misuse of the mails in a scheme to defraud investors in the stock of mining enterprises.

Five Indictments.

Four of the indictments against the defendants contain sixteen counts and the fifth contains eleven counts. Three of the indictments are against Joseph Quincy, Julian Hawthorne and John McKinnon, and the fourth is against Albert Freeman.

Hawthorne's Name a Magnet.

By the free use of Julian Hawthorne's name was procured, it is alleged, in the promotion of the various stocks. Many of the investors are declared to have been influential persons and personal friends of the journalist-promoter. In the mass of literature sent out Hawthorne is alleged to have asked his friends to "sign" his name to the "ground floor," because "it was firm and could not cave in."

The Secret of Solomon.

Pamphlets entitled "Secret of Solomon" and scattered broadcast, told in various ways, the indictment avers, that "only way to get money is to dig it out of the ground." Another pithy paragraph purported to be written by Hawthorne's father, Nathaniel Hawthorne, the novelist. It ran as follows: "Nathaniel to Julian: 'What else you do, don't try to make a living by authorship.'"

One of Hawthorne's Letters.

One letter which Hawthorne wrote, the indictment charges, and mailed to his friends, was for promoting the sale of Temagami-Cobalt stock, said in part: "You and many others would perhaps like my word for it that a piece of literature was good, or bad, because I might be assumed to know something about literature."

Wants More Money.

"I am writing to you on another subject at this time, concerning which, however, I believe I know almost as much as you. I have written about it to you in the past, and you have reverted to the profession for which I was educated, and from which I was temporarily seduced by the allurements of literature. My attention has now arrived when I want more money than the sort of literature I have produced can provide."

Interested Friends and Classmates.

"For the time being I have given up literature, and am devoting my sole ambition to Temagami. During the past week I have written about it to people who I had reason to feel knew me or knew of me—to old classmates in college and other friends. They responded, entire, beyond my expectations. I have received subscriptions for more than 250,000 shares from them. We shall sell, all told, 500,000 shares, and in order to interest you, with us I am writing to you now."

Freeman Received Royalty.

The postal authorities allege that besides getting his share of the money taken in for the sale of the various stocks, Freeman received a royalty of five cents on every share of stocks disposed by the sales company.

FREIGHT PILED HIGH ON BOSTON WHARVES.

Strike of 2,800 Longshoremen Completely Ties Up Shipping. Boston, Jan. 5.—With wharves piled high with merchandise, loaded steamers arriving with no hands to unload the freight, partially empty steamers sailing and agents contemplating turning their boats toward other ports, the longshoremen's strike for a ten cent increase in wages assumed a serious aspect tonight, so far as Boston's foreign commerce is concerned. It is estimated that 2,800 men left work at midnight and despite the efforts of city and state officials, who held several conferences with the steamship agents and the union leaders, the strike at sunset showed no signs of breaking up. It was even intimated that it might extend to the freight handlers who take care of the cargoes of coastwise steamers, but this evening these men were still at work.

Death of American Baroness.

Philadelphia, Jan. 5.—Word was received in this city today of the death in Sweden of Baroness Lillian M. de Blith, formerly Miss Lillian Moore of this city. She had been an invalid for years and was sixty years old. The baroness was the daughter of Bloomfield H. Moore, a paper manufacturer.
