

WESTERLY WANTS GRANITE BUILDING

Government's Plans for Marble Post Office Opposed—Supt. William H. Holmes Speaks at Colby Reunion—Valuable Dog Found Starving in Dense Wood—Columbian Commandery, K. T., of Norwich, to Visit Narragansett Commandery Next Wednesday.

Although bids have been officially invited for the construction of a post-office building in Westerly with marble for the material, Congressman George H. Dyer is endeavoring to have granite substituted for marble, and the granite to be quarried and dressed in the town. Mr. Dyer has taken the matter up directly with the proper authorities, claiming that granite had been previously given him that the building was to be of Westerly marble.

The Westerly board of trade has protested to Mr. Dyer that it would be necessary to have granite of the same quality as the marble, and that the difference in cost of material, it is urged, would be more than equalled by the expense of transporting granite, marble and the Westerly granite men are in readiness to quote prices to illustrate that a granite building would be constructed at a greater cost than that of marble.

William H. Holmes of Westerly, superintendent of schools, graduate of Colby college, class of 1897, was one of the speakers at the thirty-first annual dinner of the Boston alumni. Mr. Tasson remained with the dog for over an hour and left him with food and drink. He was ten weeks old, and was identified for Mr. Tasson to carry any distance. The chain was taken from the dog so that in the event of receding strength sufficient to proceed he would not again be held captive. Mr. Tasson says the dog is of good breed and he has a specimen of color as he has never seen. He will make another trip to the spot where he left the dog, to satisfy himself in regard to the animal's condition.



Danielson, Feb. 29.—Prof. Joel R. L. Douglas, 45, married, and Miss Clarabelle Hargraves, the 15-year-old girl with whom he eloped from East Killingly last Saturday, were arrested Thursday night at Westerly and locked up at the police station in that place. The couple were arrested by Chief Thomas Brown and Officer Fred Mitchell in a lodging house on Canal street, where they have been staying as man and wife since Wednesday morning, when they came to Westerly from Wakefield, where they spent Monday and Tuesday night. They were registered as Mr. and Mrs. Williams. Information that the couple were in Westerly was given the police of that place Thursday, the couple having been seen walking about the streets.
