Now that liquor raids have been started in the village of Bradford, the work is to be extended to other sections of the town of Westerly.

Ethan Wilcox, librarian emeritus of the Westerly public library, will attend the funeral of Erastus H. Gardner in Norwich today (Tuesday).

Those who lunched on the lowland, now encumbered, are demanding immediate relief from the food for the highway committee of the town council.

Already there are five prospective bidders for the mill building of the Westerly Narrow Fabric company, and the upset price has been fixed at \$15,000.

The postoffice will be in the temporary quarters next week, and the work of making the present structure to make way for the new will then be commenced.

The idle mill building of the Westerly Narrow Fabric company is being considered for utilization as a car barn for the Pawcatuck Valley Street Railway company.

The work on the granite town building and courthouse is going forward to the full satisfaction of the building commission. The construction will probably be laid next month.

There will be an increase in wages of the operatives of the White Rock cotton mill, April 1, notes to this effect being posted Monday. The amount of the increase is not defined.

Though the waters of the Pawcatuck river have lowered eighteen inches at the Broad street dam, there is no perceptible lessening of the water in the flooded sections of Westerly.

Legs are being sold to retail dealers in Westerly at 15 cents a dozen for men and 10 cents in barter. Customers are charged 25 cents a dozen, or four cents less than the wholesale price in Providence.

Underground wires are being operated in Westerly, in an endeavor to have representatives of the Anti-Saloon league attack certain licensed saloons in Westerly for alleged technical violation of law.

Dr. John L. May of Westerly, with his brother, Rev. Michael R. May of Rockville, Conn., will sail from New York Wednesday for Havana. Upon arrival there they will determine upon the route of their pleasure trip, which will probably include a visit to the Panama canal.

Witnesses from Westerly will go to New London Tuesday to testify in the superior court in the case of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Co. against Louis Cellar as to the ownership of a city hall property, so-called, located near the West Broad street bridge.

Representatives of a guaranty and title company are in Westerly examining the titles of the Westerly Woolen Mill company preliminary to the formal transfer of ownership. The purchasers are said to be the Sator Manufacturing company, the recent purchasers of the Kenyon mill property.

Funeral services of Charles M. Poole, who died Thursday in Burlington, Vt., were held Sunday afternoon at the residence of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Alexander C. Thompson, Rev. E. C. A. Jones officiating. Burial was at River Bend Monday. Mr. Poole was fatally injured in a railroad accident on a train of the Central Vermont railroad, where he was employed.

Raymond A. Slatore Arrested for Robbery at Railroad Station.

Raymond A. Slatore was arrested Monday night charged with having robbed the railroad station at Noank on last Saturday of \$97.50. He has admitted the theft, according to authorities. The money taken was assigned to the Adams Express company. Monday there was received, addressed to the agent, an envelope containing \$40 in bills. There was nothing besides the money in the envelope. The handwriting on the envelope showed some resemblance to that of Slatore, it was stated, and on the strength of that the arrest was made. When questioned, Slatore is said to have confessed. He was formerly employed as a brakeman on the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad.
