AMATEUR BOXING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Decided in Seven Classes in Annual B. A. A. Tournament at Boston—Fast Bout Between Sheridan and Lavelle at 158 Pounds—No New White Hope Brought Out.

Boston, April 9.—National amateur boxing championships were decided tonight in seven classes in the annual tournament held under the auspices of the B. A. A.

Thomas L. Regan of Boston, the only one of last year's national champions to appear successfully tonight, won his title in the 115 pound class, winning a fast bout with George H. Pritchard of Boston.

The heavyweight class had been looked to as likely to provide a new "white hope," but competition staked. Only two contenders for the prize appeared and John Silverio of Beverly, New England champion, had no trouble disposing of Thomas Kelly of Boston in one round.

Arthur Sheridan, metropolitan 158-pound champion, who was the only New York boxer to come through to the finals, won from E. A. Lavelle of Somerville, the New England champion, after three rounds of hard, close range fighting. Sheridan got the better of the exchanges, but Lavelle made the going stiff, and at the finish both men were fatigued.

Al Wambagust of New Orleans, southern champion in the 135 pound class, disposed of Michael Sullivan of Boston, New England champion, in a slugging bout.

Harvard Lost to Red Sox, 2 to 0. Boston, April 9.—Harvard's baseball nine lost its first game of the season to the Boston Americans today by a score of 2 to 0. The game which was the first played on Fenway park, the new American league grounds, was called after seven innings because of darkness. A light flurry of snow fell throughout the play.

Harvard presented a promising line. Felton was wild and lucky, giving ten bases on balls, only one of which figured in a score. Cardinal O'Connell was presented a perpetual pass, engraved on solid gold plate, to Fenway park by President J. A. McAleer, at the cardinal's home today.

Three Knockouts at Bridgeport. Bridgeport, Conn., April 9.—Gover Hayes of Columbus, O., easily had the advantage over Australian Charles Griffin in ten fast rounds tonight here at the local boxing club. Hayes did all the leading, but Hayes did the punching, putting up a clever fight. The preliminary bouts were marked by three knockouts in the first round. One was knocked out by Fred Besse of Bridgeport in the seventh, Jacky Robinson of Shelton in the eighth and Young McAniff of Bridgeport in the fourth, and Eddie Kelley was knocked out by Kid Doran in the first round.

Bob Moha Defeats Fred Hicks. New York, April 9.—Bob Moha of Milwaukee won his third bout in the world tonight by defeating Fred Hicks of Detroit in seven of ten rounds. Moha at the ringside weighed 162 1/4 pounds and Hicks just 1-1/2. Moha forced Hicks to fight from the beginning with lefts to the face and short right body blows, while Hicks reached the face at long range with straight rights to the head.

Pennell Wins Fast Match. New York, April 9.—The most interesting of the three court tennis matches played here today was that between Vane Pennell of England and W. H. T. Holm of Philadelphia. Holm attacked covering the court, but Holm was out of the game from the former Brit.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

NEARLY 1,000,000 SHARES. Market Develops Strength and Breadth After Weak Opening.

New York, April 9.—After an early period of backing and filling in which prices moved in confusing fashion, today's stock market finally grew strong and broad, with a total of transactions approaching one million shares. The opening was marked by a slight advance and declines, the latter predominating. Local sentiment again inclined to bullishness, this feeling showing itself in attacks upon the miners whose recent gains have been accompanied by some adverse comment.

The professional element appeared to see little ground for encouragement in the anarctic situation, despite the fact that the operators had conveyed confidence from figures given out at the state of winter wheat and rye. The copper figures were something of a disappointment, but far from having an unfavorable effect. Amalgamated Copper and allied shares went to better prices after they became known.

In the railway group the strength of the transportation lines as well as the Louisville and Nashville gained 1-4 points on what looked like accumulation. The buying period in coal received attention to an old rumor of a possible increase of the dividend, but legitimate reasons such as the poor, excellent earnings and the cotton crop prospects. These same conditions apply with more or less force to all the railroads in the southern and southern western territories. Union Pacific was again advancing, prices above its recent high, the stock displaying concentration strength in London. In the industrial and equipment stocks American International Harvester rose 2-4 points each. American Can common was an exception to the average run of stocks in its particular class, showing some pressure throughout the session. Best prices were general in the last hour, but before the close further reaction resulted in the usual reaction.

Call money did not get above 2-1/2 per cent, its lowest rate in some days. Time loans also showed an easier tendency, regardless of a further drain to the bond market was irregular with increased activity. Total sales, par value, amounted to \$2,941,000.

DOINGS IN THE AUTOMOBILE WORLD

Alabama Officers Run Down Criminals With a Motor Car—Hartford Strong For Motor-Driven Fire Apparatus—Field Notes.

Motor car manufacturers who are interested in the racing game are becoming somewhat anxious over the possibility of a postponement of the 500 mile International Sweepstakes at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway on Memorial Day. Last year forty-six manufacturers provided machines for the initial contest, but up to the present not more than a dozen actual entries have been received by the state.

George M. Dickson tells a thrilling story of how a car was used by officers in Alabama to run down the men charged with the Lewisburg crime of murders that recently shocked the country. Governor O'Neal, Chief of Police Bodaker, Sheriff McAdory and others used the car in a mad ride through the hazardous mountain trails.

Attachments such as removable studded leather treads, while not likely to cut or gouge the rubber, are generally so cumbersome that they destroy resistance. In other words, the tires instead of absorbing obstructions, rebound from them and thus transmit the shock to the chassis, defeating the very purpose for which pneumatic tires were designed.

An improved motor ambulance soon is to be placed in commission by the Charity hospital in Philadelphia. According to figures recently issued by the secretary of state, the number of automobile accidents in Iowa at the present time is 1,800.

Milwaukee electricians have organized the Milwaukee Electrical League. Automobile ignition and illumination will be given much attention.
