RICHESON CALMLY MEETS HIS DEATH

Left Cell Smiling, Gave Counsel Parting Handclasp and Walked to Chair With Head Erect

"GOD WILL TAKE CARE OF MY SOUL," HE SAID

Leaves Message to the World That He Has Paid His Debt and Feels That He is Going Home to God For a Larger Service—Repents of His Sin and Forgives Everybody—Potassium Cyanide Sent to Him in a Letter Received Yesterday

Boston, May 21.—Clarence V. T. Richeson was electrocuted at 12:17 this morning. The current was turned on at 12:02, and the prisoner was declared dead at 12:17. The former Baptist clergyman, who confessed the poisoning of Avis Lincoln of Hyannis, his one-time sweetheart, was outwardly calm when he entered the death chamber, and he maintained his composure while the straps and electrodes were being adjusted as he sat in the electric chair. Richeson walked to the chair, eyes straight ahead, until he sat down. When he closed his eyes and kept them shut until the end.

"I forgive everybody," he said. Seated in the chair, he was asked a series of questions by Rev. Herbert E. Johnson, his spiritual adviser. In the course of his answers he said: "God will take care of my soul and I pray for all. I forgive everybody." The last of the questions was "Are you willing to die for Jesus' sake?" "Yes, I am willing to die for Jesus' sake," he replied. "After you know, what do you want to do?" "I am willing to die."

Dead at Instant of Contact. The little form of the former pastor sturged forward in the great leather thong, but no sound came from the throat of the victim.
