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RICHESON'S BRAIN FOUND NORMAL

Autopsy Performed on the Body of the Executed Murderer by the Medical Examiner

DISPOSITION OF THE REMAINS IS UNCERTAIN

Circumstances Arise to Prevent Their Removal to Virginia—Matter Will Probably Be Settled Today—Rev. Mr. Johnson Says Questions Were Asked Richeson While Occupying Chair to Relieve Suspense of Waiting for Death.

Boston, May 21.—The body of Clarence W. T. Richeson, who was executed in the electric chair at the state prison in Charleston early today for the murder of Avis Linnell, lay at the North Grove street morgue today. Earlier in the day Dr. J. B. McGrath, medical examiner of Suffolk county, performed the autopsy required by law in the case of executed murderers and declared that Richeson's brain was normal.

Disposition of Body Uncertain. Douglas Richeson of Chicago, brother of the dead man, was undecided regarding the disposition of the remains and the matter will be settled tomorrow. It is expected that the remains will be taken to the office of Attorney William A. Morse, who was Richeson's counsel. It was understood that the body of the former Baptist minister would be taken to his boyhood home in Virginia for burial, but circumstances arose today which prevented the plan from being carried out.

GRANE NOT CANDIDATE FOR A RE-ELECTION. Massachusetts Senator Contemplates Retirement from Politics. Washington, May 21.—Senator W. Murray Crane, Massachusetts, announced today that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the United States senate before the primaries in his state next autumn. He stated: "Some months ago I definitely decided not to become a candidate for re-election to the United States senate, but I intended to defer making a statement to that effect until after the republican national convention. There is, however, a proposition pending in the Massachusetts legislature for the nomination of United States senators substituting a primary election for the present method of nomination. I am now casting relating to the nomination of candidates for congress and state executive offices. If this proposed law is enacted a much earlier campaign for this office will be necessary, and I do not wish to know my position at this time in order that those who may be interested in becoming candidates may have the fullest opportunity to have their candidacies considered."

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ROOSEVELT AND HARMON IN LEAD

Incomplete Returns From Ohio Primaries Give Ex-President an Advantage of 15,000 Votes

MAY HAVE 26 OF THE 42 DISTRICT DELEGATES. Governor Wilson Gives Governor Harmon a Close Run at the Latter's Home—La Follette Ran Well in Cleveland and Toledo—Little Over Third of Returns in and Complete Returns May Upset Present Situation—Both Claim State

Columbus, Ohio, May 21.—With little more than one-third of the total vote of the state counted at 1 o'clock this morning, Colonel Roosevelt's delegates on the republican ticket and Governor Harmon on the democratic preference ballot led Ohio's first presidential preference primary. The fight on both tickets was so close that a complete return may change final results.

Roosevelt Has Lead of 15,000. Complete returns from slightly less than 400 precincts of the state showed that Colonel Roosevelt's delegates had a lead of more than 15,000 votes over Governor Harmon's delegates. The lead was not as large as it appeared, however, because of the large number of precincts in which the returns were not yet in.
