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MAY HOLD UP GOVERNMENT SALARIES

President Taft Likely to Veto the Appropriation Bill to Save the Commerce Court

BILL PROVIDES FOR ABOLITION OF THE COURT

Must Be Passed Before Congress Adjourns to Enable President, Congressmen, Judges and Department Employees to Collect Their Stipend—Senator Smith Introduces Bill to Abolish Court and Drop Five Judges From Payroll.

Washington, June 12.—So strongly is President Taft said to believe in the need for the commerce court that his friends predicted tonight that he would veto the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, which provides for the abolition of the court.
