NOTICE! GENERAL STATUTES OF STATE OF CONN. SECTION 1288. REGULATING CELEBRATION OF FOURTH OF JULY.

Every person who, between sunset on the 3rd of July and 4 o'clock in the forenoon of the following day, or between 11 o'clock in the evening of July 4th and sunrise of the following day, shall discharge any cannon, pistol, gun, firecracker, torpedo, or any explosive, causing a loud report, or who shall by ringing a bell, blowing a horn, beating a drum or in any other manner make any disturbing noise, or make a bonfire shall be fined not more than \$5.

The police are instructed to enforce this law.
