RAIN WITH CRASHING THUNDER

Long Drout Broken Thursday Afternoon—First Rain Since Light Shower on June 24—Three Houses and a Dozen Trees and Poles Hit in Heavy Electric Storm—Trolley, Telephone and Fire Alarms Affected, But No Serious Damage.

Accompanied by a crashing thunder storm which made for electrical disturbances in this city, a torrent of rain arrived here at about 2:30 o'clock to break the long period of drought which this country has been parching since the early part of June.

At the central fire station Chief Stanton was on hand watching the switchboard and getting in the cases as fast as they were burned out. In the first flash the fuses on the Preston and Laurel Hill circuits were burned out.

Under the direction of engineers from New Haven, it is stated that a survey is being made between the two cities just as the local station is now connected with the power supply of the Putnam lines.

At the city electric light plant there was also trouble, and the lights around the city went out half a dozen times during the storm.

At the home of Supervisor Alfred Davis, on the road below the state hospital, the lightning played around the chimney of the house and set fire to the house after it had ripped things to pieces in one room.

Three Houses at Falls Struck. Three houses near the Falls were struck by lightning Thursday afternoon, but little damage was done.

Several Trees Struck. On West Main street near the First Baptist church the trolley wire and the street wires for the trolley were brought down into the street by a tree struck down by the storm.
