FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET UNDER RESTRAINT. Trading Moderately Large But Wholly Professional.

New York, Nov. 7.—None of the buoyancy which characterized yesterday's operations in stocks was manifested today. Trading, while much more active than yesterday, was moderately large, but its professional character was doubtless a source of disappointment to those who had expected that the close of the political campaign might stimulate some government demand.

Initial prices showed a number of material gains, especially in St. Paul, the copper and Sears-Roebuck in the Pacific. Pressure upon Reading and Steel resulted in a general drop in prices later with further marked weakness in Beet Sugar and a sharp break in American Cotton Oil because of the nature of an expected dividend. St. Paul was at its best in the final hour, when the balance of the list became more irregular later.

Much of the restraint shown by this market was traceable to foreign conditions. London prices for our stocks constituted a mixture of gains and losses for the contract in the previous day, when many sharp advances were recorded. Moreover, the tone of the Paris and Berlin bourses was not entirely hopeful. The Balkan situation again obtruding itself.

The weekly statements of the Bank of England and of France, while relatively negligible, were not calculated to inspire encouragement. The British institution lost \$4,000,000 gold, its total reserves decreased by as much and its liability reserves were two per cent. under last week's. The money market was dull and weaker, time rates falling as demand for call money increased. Most call loans today were made at five per cent. Bonds were again firm, with activity in St. Paul and Atchafalou issues. Total sales, par value, \$2,813,000.

United States government bonds were unchanged on call.
