After a graceful introductory speech by Mrs. Arnold upon the present anniversary and its importance, Mrs. Symington gave her story of ten years in finance.

Emery; recitation, Mrs. Nellie Peters of New Bedford; bass solo, Professor Geary; recitation, Lincoln Harris; recitation, Mrs. T. E. Austin of Cambridge; exercise, Buds of Promise of McKinley Avenue church, led by Mrs. Carroll, superintendent; duet, Mrs. Ambrose Wilson and Miss Ada Simons; chorus, Be on Time, Buds of Promise; recitation, Mrs. Ida Davis; recitation, Mrs. Martha Biggs of Hartford; solo, Rev. J. H. Dennis; paper by Mrs. C. E. Hoexter, conference B. P. superintendent. The programme was concluded by remarks by Rev. E. A. Carroll and Harrison Gresson.

At the morning session reports from the visiting women's departments were heard and discussed. In the afternoon there was a report from the Buds of Promise department by Supt. Mrs. C. E. Hoexter of Cambridge, and an address by Miss Martha P. Biggs on 'The Work of the Y. W. S. in Mission Service' was the subject of a paper by Mrs. T. E. Austin of Cambridge, Mass., and it was voted that her paper be printed in the Star of Zion and Missionary Seer papers. Mrs. M. S. Thompson of Boston reported on the work of these two publications. Mrs. Alice Scott of New Bedford was appointed delegate to the council to be held in August, 1913. It was voted to send the name of Miss Martha Biggs of Hartford to the general church, recommending that she be chosen to attend the seminary to be fitted for mission work in Africa.

A vote of thanks to the pastor, the members of the church, those in whose homes the delegates have been entertained and others who have helped in the success of the convention was passed.
