JUMPED FROM BARN: BROKE HIS NECK

H. J. Haulisch, Implicated in Mystic Scandal, Suicided When Pursued by State Police.

(Special to The Bulletin.) Mystic, Dec. 27.—H. J. Haulisch, of Greenmanville avenue, Mystic, committed suicide this evening at 7.30 by jumping from the third story window of his barn.

State Policemen Jackson and Downey were in town all day today in search of evidence in the scandal which has held the town in a state of excitement during the past two weeks and in which R. B. Chute and Amos R. Park were arrested and are under bonds of \$500 each.

With the aid of Police Chief Foley the state police had gone to arrest Haulisch at his store. They were accompanied by Prosecuting Attorney Hewitt.

On seeing the officers Haulisch fled to his barn and being pursued jumped to the ground, breaking his neck and fracturing his skull. He died almost instantly.

Haulisch was in his jewelry store when he saw the officers approaching. He fled from the store to the barn. The officers followed and cornered him on an upper floor. There they told him they were warrants for his arrest, charging him with assault upon Leah Barraclough, a 12 year old girl.

Haulisch asked permission to feed his horse before going into the barn. He then went to the attic, the officers following. Making as if to gather up hay to throw down to the horse, he drew near to the window and suddenly leaped through it. He was 65 years old and leaves a wife and two sons.

The affair, which had aroused the town, had serious consequences, but because of today's events has again worked the town to a high state of agitation.

It is expected that other arrests will follow within 24 hours.

SCHOONER AFIRE OFF BLOCK ISLAND.

Heavy Gale Cuts Off Chances of Assistance From Life-Saving Stations.

An unknown schooner afire twelve miles southeast of Block Island with no possibility of assistance from life saving stations owing to a heavy gale and high seas was reported by wireless tonight to the revenue cutters Seneca and Acushnet. The Seneca set out immediately from New London and the Acushnet was expected to go out from Woods Hole.

At ten o'clock the Seneca could be seen approaching the burning schooner, according to a report from one of the life saving stations on Block Island. The cutter at that time was about six miles from the distressed craft. She was using her searchlights. Wireless communication between the Seneca and the shore stations was poor and little could be learned from the fragments of messages picked up from the cutter.


