This will be Slim's third season as first baseman in the Whaling town, where he has made a creditable record both in batting and in hitting the horseshoe. McIntyre is keeping in shape at the local Y. M. C. A. gymnasium.

McIntyre has purchased Armstrong park and extensive improvements and alterations are to be made there to turn the park into a first-class grounds with ample accommodations. Expense, it is said, will be about \$10,000. McIntyre has a team capable of carrying off the league pennant in the very first season of the town in big company.

BABY RELIANCE II THERE. Excellent Exhibits Promised for Boston's Motor Boat Show.

Many splendid attractions are to be provided for the tenth annual Boston motor boat and engine show in Mechanics building during the first week of the February. Among the entry list of all kinds of gasoline propelled crafts will be found hulls from the trimmest power canoes to the larger semi-cruisers fitted up with all the comforts of home. Among the novelties promised are some of the prize winning boats of the season. Baby Reliance II, holder of all the world's records held at the state of last summer, it established a world's record for one mile. This mile speed trial was the most sensational and exciting event ever witnessed. The course was cleared, the mile was laid out by the starting line. On she came and the starters were read. Baby Reliance II, driven by Mr. Ryan, headed for the starting line. On she came at a speed never before witnessed on water. At the flash of a gun she seemed fairly to rise out of the water, and despite the fact that her driver was compelled to slack her speed in order to keep from crossing the course, she passed the finishing line with the three watches showing that she had completed the mile in 19 1/2 seconds, or 58 1/2 miles per hour. To look at this wonderful boat there appears nothing remarkable about her whatever in fact, her hull at rest has the appearance of an ordinary familiar boat or tender rather than that of a record breaker. She is but 19 feet 11 inches long, has a broad hull; bow, and is completely filled with machinery and when driven at high speed lifts almost completely out of the water.

MINISTERS IN FAVOR OF BOXING REGULATIONS. Would Prohibit Prize Fighting and Brutal Slugging. Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 28.—Milwaukee ministers are in favor of the passage of a state law for the regulation of boxing. A signed statement today by a committee representing the Milwaukee Federation of Churches reads: "We favor new legislation that will allow boxing matches under supervision, and that shall strictly define the meaning of the term and prohibit prize fighting and brutal slugging matches."
