GROTON POSTOFFICE
TO BE NO MORE.
Sub-Station of New London After Feb. 15.
The Groton postoffice is to be discontinued and after Feb. 15 will be a sub-station of the New London postoffice. Notice to that effect has been sent to New London and to Groton by the department at Washington.
The order from the postoffice department follows an investigation of conditions in Groton by postoffice inspectors. These inspectors reported favorably on the proposition of annexing the Groton office and the department follows their recommendations.
For many years this change has been suggested. The Groton mails have been handled through the New London office anyway, so the change will mean no great turndown.
It is supposed, as is the custom, that the Groton postmaster, Roswell S. Edgcomb, will be retained as clerk in charge. This would give him an annual salary of \$1,200 and would render him immune from removal during life and good behavior. Edgcomb has been under the political conditions, Postmaster Edgcomb, in common with republican postmasters everywhere, is in danger of removal at any time.
The free delivery system will be installed with two carriers in Groton.
FOR \$1,000 DAMAGES.
