A family jar in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Stevens at 292 West Thames street Thursday evening resulted in the arrival of the latter at the police station shortly after 2 o'clock this morning and in a severe cut on Mr. Stevens' forehead, where Dr. J. W. Callahan used seven or eight stitches to close the gash, inflicted by Mrs. Stevens. The disturbance occurred about 10 o'clock when Mrs. Stevens returned home from a visit. Mrs. Stevens claimed that her husband started to abuse her and came towards her with a piece of iron in his hand. She said that she seized the iron and struck him on the forehead in self defense. The physician was summoned and dressed the wound. According to what Mr. Stevens stated the weapon his wife used was an axe. The police were made acquainted with the affair and Sergeant Matthews and Officers Allen and Roger Cowles went down to investigate. Mrs. Stevens with her child was brought to the station house, where she was detained on a charge of breach of the peace. It was claimed that Mrs. Stevens used an axe on her husband but she denied that the axe figured in the case.
