WESTERLY TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

Members Except Councilman Langworthy Oppose Trolley Terminal in Dixon Square or Its Transfer to Railroad Avenue—Board of Trade Advocates Improved Sewerage—Old Station and Freight House to be Removed—Burglars in Newton Avenue.

The curbside complaints of the trolley car congestion in Dixon square, giving to the village of Westerly a cluttered appearance, was given attention at the monthly meeting of the Westerly town council Monday. All the members of the council were present and all, except Councilman Langworthy, seemed intent on not permitting the cars to make terminal or siding in Dixon square in the future and were against the terminal or siding in Railroad avenue in front of the station, though no suggestion was made for a more suitable place that would be alike accommodating to the public and the interested trolley companies.

Councilman Culley said something should be done to relieve the trolley congestion in Dixon square. Councilman Thomas said that when the Grosvenor-Stonington cars were permitted to come into Westerly with the understanding that relief would be given congestion on the bridge and that Dixon square was not to be the meeting place for all trolley cars. Councilman Culley said it was up to the council to take prompt action that would relieve the congestion and lessen the danger to life and limb and that the trolley people should find a remedy. Councilman Maxson stated that it was up to the council to compel the trolley cars to find a new location for transfer and turnout purposes.

electric lights at Thompson's Corners and it had not been the intention of Councilman Langworthy's declaration the trolley companies were giving good service and believed the town should cooperate in improving the service. Councilman Thomas disputed that there was good service. Councilman Langworthy said the trolley people were handicapped. To this Councilman Thomas replied: "They have handicapped you." Councilman Maxson said that perhaps arrangements could be made to have trolley tracks laid in Railroad drive on railroad property in front of the station, but he would not favor any more tracks in Railroad avenue. Councilman Flynn asked if it was necessary for the cars to pass directly in front of the railroad station. If not, perhaps arrangements could be made for a siding in Canal street, between High street and Railroad avenue.

It was finally voted that Councilman Flynn, Town Solicitor Agard and Civil Engineer McKenzie be a committee to give this whole subject investigation and consideration and report to the council, so that all members may be better informed on the conditions and to the best and fairest methods of improving the service, by lessening the public inconvenience.

Frederick H. Buffum, representing the Westerly Board of Trade, appeared before the council in the interests of sewerage in the town. He had gone as far as it was capable on the sewerage question, for a lack of sanitary and engineering knowledge, and that now the subject was up to the council for action. He suggested that the question be referred to the board of water commissioners for investigation, in the hope of getting a small appropriation at the financial town meeting to get the required examination. Upon motion of Councilman Langworthy reference was made to the water commissioners.

Charles Richmond, a chief dealer, told the council that if Junk of Police Brown had anything against him he would have to prove it. Charles said he was a taxpayer and had lived in Westerly ten years and that he always had a license until about a year ago. Then renewal of license was held up by Chief Brown. Mr. Richmond said that no stolen stuff had been found in his place and that he should not be held responsible for the illegal acts

of others. Richmond presented application for a peddler's license. On motion of Councilman Culley the whole matter was referred to Chief Brown.

STAFFORD SPRINGS

School Board and Selectmen Consider Proposition to Add to School Building and Remodel Woodlawn. N

The selectmen and school board held a joint meeting at the office of the town clerk Monday afternoon and discussed the matter of providing more room for the school children in the borough. Architect Johnson of Hartford presented plans for an addition to the present school building and also plans for remodeling Woodlawn, one of which must soon be adopted. The proposed plan for an addition contemplates a four room structure with basement which would connect with the present basement, giving ample playroom. Some changes would be made in the two rooms on the second floor on the south side of the present building which would give more seating capacity for the high school, and the lavatories would be left where are. The grades which are now on the third floor would be brought down to the first or second floor of the new part. This would allow seating capacity for 100 pupils in the high school, thus allowing ample opportunity for growth of the school.

A rough estimate of the cost, including excavation, plumbing, heating apparatus, everything except school furniture, is about \$11,000.

The changes in Woodlawn would place the high school assembly room on the first floor with sufficient recitation rooms, lavatories, etc., on the first and second floors. It also includes the changes in the basement plumbing, heating apparatus, etc. This plan is roughly estimated to cost \$8,000.

A town meeting will be called, when the citizens will be given an opportunity of deciding on the plan to be adopted.

There is to be a hearing asking for an increase of capital stock, in Hartford, Thursday afternoon and local business men are invited to attend.
