The Bridgeport Telegram, Senator Archie McNeill's paper, is very favorably impressed with Willimantic's municipal ice venture, as will be seen from the following extracts of praise which was printed editorially:
"Mayor Daniel P. Dunn of Willimantic has put the ice trust out of business in his home city, all at one stroke and so readily that everyone up in Willimantic must be asking, 'Why didn't we think of that before?'"

Joseph Bock, who was arrested by Chief Richmond in New Haven Saturday for deserting his wife and several children, was brought before Judge Arnold at the session of the police court Monday morning. By an agreement between the accused and the state, Selectman Mitchell and Prosecuting Attorney E. Frank Burgeo, Bock turned over \$150 to the first selectman as a guarantee that he would support his family for a year, the amount of which the wife's family becomes a burden to the town during that period.

The plant of the Windham Silk company is running at only half its capacity on account of the labor troubles at the dyeing concerns at Paterson, N. J. President Larabee left for New York Monday to confer with the company's manager of their office in that city. He will also visit Paterson while on the strike situation. If the difficulty continues, officials of the silk company and the Roselle Velvet company, who are also affected by the Paterson labor trouble, say in ten days they will be obliged to shut down their plants entirely, which would throw about 400 employees out of work.
