

THREE FREED FROM MARITAL BONDS

Two Husbands And One Wife Granted Their Petitions in Superior Court By Judge Williams— Women Proved Unfaithful—Man Deserted His Wife.

Uncontested divorce has been granted here in the superior court. The divorce was granted, one husband and one wife went over to the city against Judge Williams.

On the grounds of adultery Jeremiah Wilcox of Colchester obtained a divorce from Elizabeth Wilcox of Norwich, to whom he was married on June 20, 1904. The defendant, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Paleno, was sentenced on Feb. 7, 1912, to ten months' term in the New London county jail for the crime of adultery with Charles Eiderkin of Colchester.

Mr. Wilcox, who is 54, testified that the first he knew of his wife's unfaithfulness was when he was called home one day and told that his wife had been arrested on the adultery charge. They had always lived together happily before then.

Marriage of Miss Gatharine S. Drier. Annulled in Supreme Court. By a decision of Justice Harrington Putnam of the supreme court, Brooklyn, N. Y., handed down Thursday, the marriage of Miss Katherine S. Drier of Montague Terrace, this borough, and Edward Trumbull Smith, the artist, of Detroit, Mich., and London, England, was annulled.

Miss Drier is a member of a wealthy Brooklyn family and is a sister of Miss Mary Drier, who is well known in the borough as a suffragist and sociological worker. Her action for an annulment of the marriage came up before Justice Putnam about two weeks ago. Smith was represented by counsel, who appeared merely to protect his client's "legal rights" and did not oppose the motion. It was shown that Smith had married Miss Drier in Bedford Park, London, in 1908.

Mrs. Caroline A. Smith of Stonington, an aunt of the artist, said in a deposition that she attended the wedding of her nephew and Miss Drier but did not know of his other marriage until about a year later.
