THE WINDHAM SCHOOL BURNED

(Continued from Page One.)

In the year 1878 Mr. Welch found that there were two pupils who had completed four years of work in the higher branches, and the first class, consisting of George F. Taylor and Mrs. W. N. Potter, was graduated.

In 1878 the town committee declared itself in favor of the separation of the grammar and high departments, and the establishment of a town high school. Good work was being done, but still better would be possible if the separation should take place. Good educational advantages would draw to Willimantic pupils from conditions and would attract to them contemplating residence within the town. "In this view," said the committee, "it seems fair to subject a discussion whether the time has not arrived when the establishment of a high school, free for the whole town, should be seriously considered."

Evidently this had little effect upon the public for two years later the committee declared in its report that it was time there was a high school which was free to the whole town. The existing system made it necessary that those who lived in district 1 pay taxes towards the general support of the schools and also tuition if their children attended the high department of district 2. This condition was manifestly unfair and ought to be remedied. The suggestion was made that the department of district 2 be made a town high school.

No action followed this suggestion, and in 1880 out of self-defense the taxpayers of the first established a department similar to that in the second district, and offering the same advantages.

It was not long before the voters began to realize that two high schools were an unnecessary expense. The committee's report of that year shows the absurdity of it by saying the town of Windham needed a high school, but did not need two. The existing condition was a waste of money, and better work could be done if all interests were in one principal's hands.

For some time the question was discussed, until in the town meeting the plan of consolidation was suggested by St. L. Tryon, a member of the school committee. The committee gave several reasons for consolidation, among them being the facts that there were enough pupils and only enough for one high school, that a high school would inspire pupils to enter it, that a high school would attract people to Willimantic. They also said that simply

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as a matter of justice there ought to be consolidation in 1888.

In 1888 the plan of consolidation was carried out. Rooms in the Natchaug building were rented to the town, and the most gratifying progress was made. The number of pupils increased and a considerable sum was realized in tuition from out-of-town pupils. The courses were revised and enlarged and more teachers were added to the faculty, music and drawing and education were introduced, and a school paper, the Pioneer, was started. The attendance increased so that in 1891 a committee was appointed to investigate the feasibility of a new building. This committee seems to have taken no action until the report of \$400 to \$500. Then something had to be done. Finally a vote was taken to erect a new building to be situated on the corner of Windham and Prospect streets, facing Windham. It was authorized to deliver them before an audience, and they have practice in parliamentary law. All these have been helpful experiences. The different classes and the faculty have contributed over \$500, which has been used in the decorating of the school walls and in the purchase of pictures and other things. More than that, the society has been organized to create a school spirit by bringing the classes together in work for a common aim. Two other such societies, the Philomina in Danbury, and the Phi Theta in Danbury, both organized through Mr. Peterson's efforts, exist in the state of Connecticut.

Another marked advancement was the reorganization of the athletic association. Before this time football, basketball and baseball games had been played by so-called school teams, which were really made up of a few high school pupils and more "ringers." The new constitution stated that no

organization of graduates of Windham should be played which was not made up entirely of school members. A year later another clause was added which made good scholarship a requirement for a position on the team. Another clause stated that no post-graduate should play. By these measures the school declared itself zealous of clean athletics and high scholarship. Athletic contests were not only held on the campus, but the boys were engaged in with the high schools of Putnam, Rockville, Stafford Springs and Danvers, and good work was done by the representatives of Windham High.

During the three years in which Edwin Burgee was principal commercial branches were introduced, but not until 1911 was the course made complete by the introduction of typewriting and stenography.

Another of the best work in conducting was for three years offered by the Windham club in Yale university. An association of graduates of Windham High then students, at Yale. Members of this club did everything in their power to help the school, to promote its interests and to arouse desire for the best that education could give.

VALUABLE RECORDS LOST
