ARMORY BILL PREVAILS (Continued from Page One.)

Mr. Healey said he did not believe that the house meant to deprive the city of Waterbury from its greatly needed armory, or other places where actually needed.

Mr. Thoms of Waterbury spoke in favor of the armory in Waterbury and the need for it, and everybody in the state interested in military matters concurred in the need.

Mr. Magee hoped the motion to reconsider would prevail, and if so voted he would present for each armory matter in separate bills and give the members opportunity to decide each upon its merits.

Mr. Cabne of Naugatuck declared that Mr. Koppelman's motion to indefinitely postpone was the most vicious of the session, and considering what had been done for Hartford in this matter, he should feel ashamed of himself.

Mr. Avery of Groton said he opposed the bill on account of its blanket feature, but favored reconsideration, so that each proposed armory could be acted upon separately.

The motion to reconsider prevailed. Then Mr. Magee asked for suspension of the rules that the several appropriations for armories might be considered separately. The motion prevailed.

The resolution providing for an armory in Waterbury was presented, the cost not to exceed \$175,000, was adopted without opposition.

Resolution was then presented for site for armory. The bill was passed. Mr. Magee said he was presenting the bills in order as named in the original resolution.

Mr. Healey said there was not an armory site in Bristol. Mr. Healey said those who were familiar with the conditions at Bristol would vote for the bill, as it was not to carry an appropriation for armory, and a vote of 73 to 64.

The resolution for an armory at Middletown was presented, the cost not to exceed \$175,000, was adopted without opposition.

Resolution appropriating \$25,000 for an armory for Troop B of Hartford was presented and passed. Mr. Koppelman was not opposed.
