SEARCH CONTINUES FOR WM. O'BRIEN. West Side Man Who Disappeared Thursday is Still Missing—Relatives Searched All Day Sunday—Man Answering Description Seen Sunday Near Raymond Hill.

Spurred on and encouraged by the news that William O'Brien of Avery street, who has been missing from his home since Thursday, has been twice seen by George F. Nolan near Stony Brook reservoir, and that a man answering Mr. O'Brien's description had been seen in Mohogee and on Pitch Hill, in the town of Montville, on Friday, his sons and other relatives pushed an active search for him on Sunday.

Since he disappeared he has been seen Thursday evening about 7 o'clock going past the home of Mr. Nolan at Mohogee. The next morning Mr. Nolan saw him near Stony Brook reservoir and spoke to him three times before he is keeping of the roads, traveling crossroads from place to place, and sleeping at night in barns or other farm buildings.

As soon as he had heard of this new discovery the whereabouts of Mr. O'Brien, Captain Warren B. Burrows, was asked to telephone, calling up all the places possible in that locality, but without result. It is believed that he is keeping over their sheds, barns and outbuildings or wagons that might be standing outside.
