DOHERTY AT SCENE OF THE WRECK

Indicates to Coroner Points at Which He Applied Air and the Emergency Brakes

CORONER MAKES OBSERVATIONS OF DISTANCES

On the Hypothesis That These Distances Are Accurate, Railroad Men Testify That There Must Have Been Something Wrong With the Air Brakes and That Doherty Showed Good Judgment—No Practical Automatic Stops Known

Stamford, Conn., June 20.—After a lapse of several days, Coroner John J. Phelan of Fairfield county late today resumed his investigation of the wreck of the Springfield express on the New Haven road, in which six lives were lost on June 12. Charles J. Doherty, who crashed into the express, went with the coroner and other officials to the scene of the accident and pointed out the various places where he said he had applied the brakes in his fruitless endeavor to stop the great superheater engine.

Doherty Accompanies Coroner. Going to a spot approximately 3,300 feet east of the distant signal, he told the coroner that here was where he first saw the "yellow eye." He applied 15 pounds of air at a point 1,200 feet east of the same signal. When the engine did not slow down, he applied a pressure of 10 pounds more. This was 200 feet nearer the "yellow eye," he estimated. Then, as the engine showed no signs of lessening its speed, he put on the emergency brake, and he applied the whole thing. Walking slowly along the tracks toward Stamford station, Doherty came to a spot where he "checked" and said he thought he applied the emergency brakes there. The distance was measured, and it was found to be 1,200 feet from the signal. The signal being some distance away from the place where the wrecked train stood.
