After many years of petitioning on the part of residents of Boswell avenue and intersecting streets, I am able to report to you that Robert W. Perkins and the Board of Public Works of this section of the state assured me this morning and gave permission for me to report to the council that the rails and ties have all been ordered and will be here in a very short time. Work of laying the tracks will commence just as soon as the rails and ties arrive. \$40,000 for Gas Holder.
