PIONEER NEWSBOY

OF THIS SECTION. The Late William T. Storey Carried Papers in Norwich in 1847.

The death of William T. Storey of Broad street, Groton, occurred Saturday afternoon. It was a great shock to his many friends and brought grief to those who were near and dear to him.

Mr. Storey was for many years a member of the board of directors of the best known men in Groton, courteous and affable, sparing no personal effort to please, and won the affection of all who met him.

Mr. Storey was a native of Norwich and can probably claim to be the pioneer newsboy of this section of the state. He carried papers in this city as early as 1847. He was born in 1857, in the town of Groton, and married Laura Brown Storey. In 1885 he went into the fruit and confectionery business for himself in Groton. For many years he was active in public affairs and was a staunch republican. He was a member of the Board of Supervisors, the Hibbom club, he married Mary Tracy Fielding of Mohegan in 1888 at East Douglas, Mass. He leaves 24 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. He is survived by his wife, Mary T. Storey, and seven children--Mrs. Norman E. Hamilton, Miss Laura M. Storey, Mrs. William B. Frothingham, Joseph Gray, Mrs. Charles Gray, Herbert V. Storey, Mrs. D. The selectmen have prepared the 25th report of the finances of the town, covering the past year, which is soon to be issued in printed form before the annual town meeting.

It shows that the entire expenses of running the town's business for the year were \$230,809.55, and that there is a balance in the hands of Town Treasurer Charles S. Holbrook at the end of the year of \$43,594.04.

The general expense account the receipts have been as follows: Balance on hand, \$35,342.07; liquor license account, \$29,150.00; town and property tax account, \$204,222.00; and personal tax account, \$5,698.58. A total of \$274,413.62.
