

SUICIDE WITH CARBOLIC ACID

Fred Rezzioni, 21, Separated From the Girl He Loved, Found Dead at No. 163 High Street—Left His Boarding Place Sunday—All Indications Point to Suicide Theory, Says Coroner.

The badly decomposed body of Fred Rezzioni, 21, was found Wednesday shortly before noon in a bedroom in the house No. 163 High street, which is occupied by Mrs. Adele Camilucci.

The man had worked at the stove foundry, and employees there said he had been at work at 9 o'clock on Monday morning. The label to the bottle found in the room was found. The cork was on the window sill. The label showed that the carbolic acid had been bought at the Rathbone drug store at the corner of West Main and Thames streets.

FORMER OCCUM WOMAN KILLED ON CROSSING.

Mrs. Mary Donnelly Struck by Train at North Grosvenordale—Was Mother of Rev. B. M. Donnelly.

(Special to The Bulletin.) Putnam, Sept. 24.—Mrs. Mary Donnelly, about 60 years of age, mother of Rev. B. M. Donnelly, rector of St. Joseph's church, North Grosvenordale, was instantly killed about 4 o'clock this afternoon when she was struck by a freight train on the New Haven and Worcester division of the New Haven road at the church crossing. Her skull was crushed in, but there were no other marks on the body.

DAVENPORT BUILDING FOR TROLLEY EXPRESS STATION. Negotiations Ahe Underway with Shore Line Electric Railway Co.

Negotiations are underway looking toward the acquisition of the so-called Elevator or Davenport building by the Shore Line Electric railway for a freight depot for trolley express. When acquired for this purpose the building will provide facilities for running the trolley tracks into the building and for a trolley freight station under cover.

Mr. Melville met the missing carrier in Christopher street.

HIS LIFELESS BODY FOUND IN A SHED. William Maynard of New London Dead Probably Several Days.

Lying in an obscure part of a storage shed of Denison & Brown, New London lumber dealers, the lifeless body of William Maynard, about 55 years of age, was found about 4:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon by Alice Cooper and Hazel Sullivan. Acting for several weeks and whose whereabouts the body, anatomist that death had been due to a disease of the heart, superinduced by alcoholism. The rigid condition of the body showed that the man had been dead two or three days.

FOR SUPERIOR COURT. Joseph Donovan Bound Over from Groton Court on Assault Charge.

Joseph Donovan of Groton was bound over to the superior court at a hearing in Groton town court Tuesday evening by Judge Albert F. Hewitt. Donovan was arrested by Special Officer George O. Vincent, Tuesday morning under a charge made by William Kilpatrick, employed on the Fish farm at Eastern Point. Donovan is alleged to have assaulted Kilpatrick and the latter is recovering from a painful wound in the face from a pitchfork wielded by his assailant. Donovan was discharged from the Eastern Point farm after a hearing and Tuesday morning went to the farm and assaulted Kilpatrick. Judge Hewitt placed Donovan under bonds of \$500.

Town Treasurer's Balance. A wrong inference was drawn from the annual report of the town treasurer in stating that he closes the year with a cash balance of over \$43,000 on hand. The balance that he will carry forward to next year will be \$43,244.84, but of this amount there is only \$13,462.82 in cash and the balance is in uncollected taxes amounting to \$30,000.00 in these bills which is charged to the treasury and has to be paid in his balance.
