READY FOR ARGUMENTS.

Evidence is All in Trial of Ruby Parker on Attempted Arson Charge.

In the superior court here on Friday the trial of the case of state vs. Ruby Parker of East Lyme on the charge of attempted arson at the barn of Israel Wilensky was all concluded, but the arguments, which are to be heard on Tuesday.

The morning was occupied with the cross examination of the defendant, which occupied till about noon. When court took a recess and did not return in again for about two hours. In the afternoon rebuttal testimony was given by State Policeman Downing, Mrs. Wilensky, Mrs. Spollen and Mr. Wilensky. The last three denied that certain conversations which Mr. Parker had testified to had ever taken place between them and the accused. When Mr. Wilensky was asked if he had ever been in a hotel washing dishes in New York, of which Mr. Parker had testified, he answered: "I never was in a dish washer and I never would be."

The state rested at 3.25 and the attorneys did not care to begin the arguments then. During the day W. E. Kenyon, who had previously been given the charge of attempted arson at the barn of Israel Wilensky, was brought in on a bench warrant, having been arrested by State Policeman Downing. She was accused on two counts with harboring a female for purposes of prostitution. The name of one girl mentioned in the complaint was Alice Hunt and the other George Richter, both of New London. The dates of the alleged offenses went back to October, 1911.

According to the state's attorney this was a place against which the New London police had been directed to the place where the girl was to be kept, but he said that all it was necessary to do was to ask the neighbors what was going on. Visits to the place were made in the daytime, he said and not at night, and on one day seventeen men were known to have gone there.

Attorney C. D. James was assigned to the accused. Bonds were placed at \$1,000 and she went to jail. The attorney pleading not guilty for her with the understanding that he might change the plea later.

In connection with the same case, George Smetz was presented on the charge of harboring a prostitute. A female named Viola was used for purposes of prostitution. He pleaded not guilty and the bond was also placed at \$1,000 for him, and he was taken to jail.

CROPS IN CONNECTICUT

For September Showed 90.7 Per Cent. of the Normal. The condition of all crops in this state on Sept. 1 was 90.7 per cent. of the normal. The figures given out by the federal department of agriculture for Connecticut crops on Sept. 1 are as follows: Corn, 81 per cent.; wheat, 87 per cent.; oats, condition 85 per cent.; hay, condition 84 per cent.; clover, condition 77 per cent.; soybeans, condition 84 per cent.; apples, condition 79 per cent.; peaches, condition 83 per cent.; grapes, condition 81 per cent.; cranberries, condition 83 per cent.; tobacco, condition 75 per cent.; clover, condition 83 per cent. on Sept. 1, 1912.

STRATFORD WOMAN KILLED BY TRAIN.

Took Short Cut Across Tracks on Return from Shopping Tour.
