PORFIRIO DIAZ RECALLED TO MEXICO

Report in Mexico City That Ex-President Has Been Invited by Huerta to Return

GEN. DIAZ DENIES RECEIVING SUCH A MESSAGE

Now at Biarritz, France, and Intends to Remain There Until Middle of October—Liberal Republicans Name Col. de la Fuente For the Presidency—Gen. Felix Diaz to be Candidate But Praises Gamboa—Huerta Supports Gamboa.

Mexico City, Sept. 28.—Colonel David de la Fuente, former minister of communications and public works in General Huerta's cabinet, has been put forward as a presidential candidate by the so-called liberal republican party.

Declined by Blanquet. The liberal republican candidacy was first offered to Aurelio Blanquet, the minister of war, but was declined by him with the assertion that he was not prepared to enter the race and would not accept the candidacy of any party.

Party Not Strong. The naming of this new ticket is not generally regarded as a matter of great political importance, since the sphere of influence of the liberal republicans is confined to the capital, and neither candidate has any great following.

Report of Ex-President Diaz's Recall. A story is current in the latest development of the internal situation, the announcement of the recall to Mexico of the ex-president, Porfirio Diaz. Coupled with General Huerta's announcement to the Mexican press, it is held to be the chief event of the week.

Will Stand for Nomination, but Speaks Highly of Gamboa. Paris, Sept. 28.—General Felix Diaz sent a cable message to Senator Gamboa today expressing his felicitations and compliments upon the nomination of Senator Gamboa to the presidency of Mexico by the Catholic party.

General Diaz will sail on the steamer Corcovado from Havre for Mexico on Tuesday.
