Taxes Collected on Last Levy.

Town Tax Collector G. N. Wood shows that he has collected \$23,946.67 of the levy of \$26,108.05 for 1912, leaving \$3,061.38 uncollected.

Schools Cost \$12,294.87.

The school committee—Charles W. Comstock, John F. Brown and Matt A. Tinker—also make their annual report, which shows that \$12,294.87 was the total paid for schools. The items were as follows: Teachers' salaries, \$6,618.30; fuel, \$858.04; janitors' wages, \$753.50; repairs, \$125.36; transportation of school children, \$809.76; high school tuition, \$1,161; high school transportation, \$863.80; incidentals, \$406.54; books and supplies, \$357.12; elementary school tuition—Norwich, Waterford and Bozrah, \$120.33; library and apparatus, \$12.29; school board, \$75; unused tickets, \$25.30.

As compared with the preceding year the net cost to the town was much more for schools, \$9,245.50, as against \$5,889.93, a principal reason for this showing appearing in the difference in average attendance grant from the state. In 1911-1912 it was \$3,385.19, but in 1912-1913 it was \$499.14. This decrease in the item is evident from the report, as is because of the large increase in the grand list of the town of Montville. In 1911-1912 the total cost of school was \$12,944.49, and in the year just past it was \$12,294.87. The net cost to the town for all school purposes the past year was 4-5 mills on a dollar.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL DAYS
AT Y. M. C. A.

Programmes Arranged for Several Days Next Week.

The annual "grammar school days" at the Y. M. C. A. are scheduled for next week and four afternoons will be devoted to the entertainment of the boys from the various schools of the city. Boys' Secretary J. H. Ely and Physical Director Nickerson have arranged an attractive program for each day and much interest is evident among the boys. "Grammar school days" mark the opening of the season in the boys' department each year. Each district has a committee of boys to help in carrying out the arrangements and the chairman of the various committees are as follows: Norwich Town, Walter Durr; Greenville, Bradford Ricketts; Broadway, Gustave Nelson; West Chelsea, Samuel Ableman.

The Norwich Town boys will be entertained Monday, Greenville Wednesday, Broadway Thursday and West Chelsea Friday. There will be athletic events in the gymnasium. The boys of 14 and 15 will compete in the running high jump, standing broad jump and potato race and for the boys of 12 and 13 there will be the running high jump, standing broad jump and relay race. Winners in these various events from each school will take part in the interschool competition Friday, October 11 and a banner will be awarded the winning school. Refreshments will be provided the boys at the close of the events.
