The first semi-annual distribution of premiums to place this week when more than \$7,500 was passed out to operatives who have been extra faithful in doing their work.

The aggregate of the present year is expected to reach a total of from \$15,000 to \$18,000 and approximately 40 per cent of the employees of the mills will share in the awards.

These awards are given on the basis of continuous service and extra efficient work averages earned during the year per family having an earning capacity of \$5.00 a day.

Agent Johnstone expects that the premium awards will continue to increase up to the time when they will amount to \$25,000 a year.
