ONE MORE DEATH SENTENCE IMPOSED

Joseph Buono, Alleged White Slaver, to Hang March 18th.

Bridgewater, Conn., Nov. 6.—After three hours' deliberation the jury in the second trial of Joseph Buono for the murder of Jennie Savagors in Putney on October 22, 1912, found him guilty of murder in the first degree and he was sentenced by Judge Reed to be hanged on March 18 next.

The case is the celebrated one wherein it was alleged Buono followed the woman, his white slave, here from Chicago, took her for an auto ride to Stratford, chased the chauffeur away and then coldly murdered the woman. He was convicted and sentenced to die a year ago, but on an appeal, error was found on technicalities and a new trial ordered.
