Watch Night Services—Bank Commissioners Commend Savings Bank's Securities—White Way Lights Fade

Local banks are in receipt of communications from the state bank commissioners relative to the closing of the Putnam Savings bank this week, stating that "we trust that the state and savings banks will do all they can to help the depositors of the Putnam bank" this with reference to making loans on the passbooks of the latter institution. The latter state that that banks will be absolutely safe in loaning up to 80 or 90 per cent of the amounts called for by the passbooks, as the Putnam bank has a fine list of securities, though the value of many of its railroad bonds are now depressed, and the books of the bank are in excellent condition.

OBITUARY

Frank Montville

Frank Montville died Wednesday morning at his home on Bullock street after an illness of several years. He would have been 72 years of age on the 12th day of January. Mr. Montville was born in Sorrel, Canada, January 16th, 1842. He came to Putnam in 1867 to Putnam when he had 8 years, his parents with several other families to the number of twenty walking the whole way by slow stages. His first employment was in a cotton mill. Later he entered the Corbin shoe shop and worked in the shoe business for C. M. Fisher & Co. and Corbin & Burnam for a period of over 30 years. He helped in the construction of a number of buildings in Putnam among which were the first Catholic church subsequently destroyed by fire, the Methodist church, the parochial schools. The last work he did was to furnish gravel and sand for the building of schools in and out of town.

Woodstock. He retired from active work six years ago. For 19 years Mr. Montville was a member of St. Mary's band and always came to the rescue of that organization in time of financial depression. He was a member of St. Jean Baptiste and Sacred Heart and Holy Name societies and a devout member of St. Mary's church.

April 24th, 1859, Mr. Montville married Miss Lucy Gomont of Putnam. The wedding was performed by the late Father Duffy of Harrisville, R. I. who at that time came to Putnam twice a month to say mass. His wife died nine years ago on the 21st of December. Eight children were born to them and are Joseph and Marceline of this city, Peter of Woodstock and Mrs. Victor Grenier of Stafford Springs. Two other sons, Mrs. Olive Dumas of Putnam and Mrs. Caroline Bisbuit of Canada.

Employees of the mill have shown their appreciation of his long service by presenting him a purse of \$50 and a handsome pipe.
