FLOODS FOLLOW STORM

ON THE PACIFIC COAST.

Sewers Choked, Streets Torn Up and Traffic Demoralized.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 7.—The Pacific coast, from San Francisco to British Columbia, was drenched and flooded today by storms which have continued for ten days and which have extended well inland.

Basements are flooded, sewers blocked, trolley service demoralized and streets torn up at Astoria, Ore. Twenty vessels are weather-bound in that harbor. Many houses on sloping ground are in danger.

At Tacoma rain has caused damage over a wide area. Railroad traffic has been delayed by washouts.

Dynamite Near Prosecutor's Office.

Lansie, Mich., Jan. 7.—Disclosure of the fact that a stick of dynamite had been discovered in the building where the prosecuting attorney of this county has his office caused a sensation here today. The explosive was found on the stairway leading to the quarters of Hubert Brennan, who has been assisting Prosecutor Lucas of Houghton county in the strike cases brought here on change of venue.

FRANK FALCONE IS THE ACCUSED—JUDGE ORDERS COURT CLEARED

During Testimony—Men Put on Probation and Nolle Entered in Several Other Cases.

The second day of the January criminal term of the superior court came in here at 11:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning.

In the morning the court was occupied with hearing a number of pleas and sentences were imposed. Before the noon recess was reached the trial of Frank Falcone of this city was started on the charge of small knowledge of a minor female. This occupied the rest of the day until court adjourned at 4 o'clock.

When that hour was reached State's Attorney Hull suggested that the court here was to adjourn at 4:30. Judge Burpee seemed somewhat surprised and not altogether pleased, as he closed his book with a bang and directed the sheriff to adjourn court till 9:30 the next morning, which is half an hour earlier than usual.

Three Placed on Probation.

In the morning the first case called up was that of Frank Antonette, alias Frank Henriquez, of this city, who charged his plea in the case on the charge of having dynamite in his possession in this city on Sept. 25 without a license. After a plea for him was made by Attorney Alyn L. Brown, Judge Burpee made his sentence three months in jail, suspending it on probation in this city.

Charles Jackson pleaded guilty to the theft of five feet from Mrs. Lee on Jail Hill on Dec. 14. Following the plea made for him by Attorney W. Douglas, he was given a sentence of three months in jail, which was suspended, and he was ordered to report to the probation officer, Rev. Mr. Northrop.

William Reimer of New London, who has a wife and four children, pleaded guilty to the theft of 600 pounds of metal from the New London Ship and Engine company. After a plea for leniency made by Attorney C. B. Smith, Reimer was sentenced to four months in jail, which was also given the benefit of suspended sentence with the provision that he report to Probation Officer Mansfield of New London. The accused has been in jail since Nov. 10.

Nolle Entered.

A nolle was entered in the case of state vs. Dominick Conda of this city. The state's attorney said that the woman was not harmed and at the time of the alleged assault the woman and the man with mother man had all been drinking beer. He said the woman has had three illegitimate children. Attorney Alyn L. Brown appeared for the accused.

A woman who thought she had been referred to stepped inside the bar and said she was one of the complaining witnesses, but she wished to deny that she has ever had any illegitimate children. Attorney Smith assured the woman that she had mistaken the case and had not been referred to.

Jewett City Cases Nolle.

The cases of the state vs. Frank Moriarty and David Synington of Jewett City, accused of assault upon Shaughnessy, were called up. The attorneys were W. G. Murray and T. M. Shields. Major Hull said that he had been drinking and the prosecutor of the Griswold town court had told him there was little foundation for the charge made such as to constitute a crime. The alleged trouble took place at a lumber yard after the people had been around the railroad station. The court adjourned at 4:30.

Falcone Trial Begun.

Then a jury was selected for the trial of the case of the state against Frank Falcone of this city. In the trial the state's attorney is assisted by Attorney John J. Hall. Brown & Perkins appear for the accused, who is about 35 to 40 years old. The girl in the case is identified as Rose Serra, 9 years old, who lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Serra on Main street on the East Side.

The first witness was the mother of the little girl, Mrs. Charles Serra, who told of having her attention called to her daughter on the afternoon of Sunday, October 26th last. The child was standing in front of the house crying and her clothes were torn and her hair matted with the signs of outrageous ill treatment.

Judge Orders Court Cleared.

When the afternoon session of court came in, there was a large attendance of spectators. Attorney Edmund W. Perkins conducted the cross examination of Mrs. Serra.

When Dr. J. J. Donohue was called to give the medical testimony in the trial, Judge Burpee ordered the court cleared of all except those immediately concerned in the case. Those who had been in the courtroom seats were all sent outside into the corridor where they lingered. Later they had to be sent from there as their moving about in lines made such a noise that it was difficult to hear the testimony in the courtroom.

Dr. Donohue testified to the way the Serra child was injured. He was given a brief cross-examination.

Chief George Linton of the Norwich police followed Dr. Donohue on the stand and told of the information that came to him of the assault and of his action in sending out policemen to look for and arrest Falcone. He also told of Mrs. Serra bringing Rosa to the police headquarters, of what Frank Falcone had done to her and identified some of her undergarments which he said had been in his possession since the day of the assault. He stated that the accused had been arrested on the street by Policeman Henry Fenlon on the Monday night following the day of the assault. The Norwich

police chief also described the street locations and the surroundings on Ripley hill where the assault was alleged to have taken place. There are open lots and pasture land and the chief said it would be possible at some points for a person to be concealed out of sight of any of the houses in the neighborhood.

State's Attorney Hull informed the court that he expected to have a plan of the premises for an exhibit in court on the next day of the trial.

Chief Justice cross-examined by Attorney Perkins.

The next witness was Mrs. Henry Bramann, who lives on East Main street, near the school shop, which is about two minutes' walk from the Serra home. On the afternoon of October 12 she had been on her way to work making a call, going by a pathway which came out on Ripley hill, from which she could see the Holy Name parade ways as being held in Norwich that Sunday. On the way back to her home through the pasture on Ripley hill, she heard a child crying and boys talking about the cows. Mrs. Bramann identified in court two small boys, who she said she saw there the day of the assault, and the boys ran into the bushes where the cry was coming from and a man came out. She knew Frank Falcone, she said, and she told the court she stood looking at her and then went back. Then the witness heard the child cry louder. Falcone came out again and Mrs. Bramann said she told him if he did not let the child come out she would have him arrested. Then he went back and the child came out of the bushes and was the Serra child. She did not see the child any time before it came out of the brush.

The place was out of sight of any house. Falcone went away in the opposite direction and the child came with her and to her home. The witness said that she could see the Serra child's undergarments were torn off and the child was holding them on with both hands.

Upon cross-examination by Attorney Perkins the witness recounted again the way she had gone that day to Ripley hill and what had happened there. She denied that she saw the Serra house on the following Monday morning and had a drink with the Serra family, and she denied that she had told Rosa Falcone, on the way to court, that she couldn't tell who the man was. The witness said that on the way to court she had asked her to save her father for the sake of her mother, but Mrs. Bramann had replied that she would have to lie to save him.

Major Hull drew a diagram on the blackboard to show the street locations in the neighborhood where the assault is alleged to have been committed and used it in questions he asked Mrs. Bramann after Attorney Perkins concluded the cross examination.

Earl E. Mathewson, clerk of the Norwich police court, who was acting in that capacity today, was sworn and testified to going to the place where the alleged assault took place and having the places pointed out to him by Mrs. Bramann and by the state's attorney on the day of this trial with the state's attorney. Mr. Mathewson testified to the trampled condition of the grass and the wild apple tree, and he produced a piece of white cloth which he found there. The spot is secluded and is on the back of the house. Court adjourned at 4:30 till the next day.

EDWARD H. HALL'S OPINION

Expressed in New York Paper on Derivation of the American Flag.

Edward Hagaman Hall, a former assistant editor of The Bulletin, secretary of the American Science and Historic Preservation society, writing to a New York paper, says:

After visiting various places in England and identifying with me the architects and studying the Washington arms on ancient seals at Durham, an old stained glass window and in venerable buildings like the Surrey Manor house, I have come to a different conclusion from that expressed by Mr. Wardrop in the article headed "The English Heritage," published in the English Historical Review, "Dedicated to Peace," concerning the derivation of the United States flag from the Washington coat of arms. My reasons briefly are these:

As to the stripes—there were flags of thirteen red and white stripes in use in England before the American Revolution was born. As early as 1704, and probably earlier, the flag of the East India company of England consisted of thirteen horizontal stripes with a white canton. A French work, published in 1727, shows a similar flag with the title "Pavillon de Rang, ou de Division d'Escadre."

As to the stars—the stars, so-called, in Washington's arms, are white on a white field, our stars are white on a blue field. Now there were several English personages who had in their coats of arms on a blue field, as for instance, the celebrated William Lord Douglas and George War of Blackwood (registered 1572), who were heraldic authorities and have better authority for deriving the elements of our flag from sources other than Washington's coat of arms. Furthermore, the Washington stars and our stars have an entirely different significance. The Washington stars are heraldic mottoes, the stars of a knight's surcoat, and in early examples of them which I found in England they are pierced with little holes in the center, representing the rivet holes. Our stars are celestial stars, the law of congress of 1777 adopting the flag declaring that they represent a "new constellation."

I have been compelled by the results of my investigations reluctantly to yield my early predilection to accept the frequently repeated theory of the derivation of our flag from the Washington arms. There is really no authority for that claim. It has been so safely do to connect the two is to say that the existence of stars and horizontal stripes of red and white in both is an interesting coincidence and that the sight of one may well make us think of the other.
