

WESTELY NO-LICENSE COMMITTEE

To Join in Campaign With State Anti-Saloon League—Hancock Post Presented Picture of Thomas D. Sheffield—Camp Fire Girls' Union Council Fire.

The Westely no-license committee held a meeting Wednesday evening at which it was decided to cooperate with the Rhode Island Anti-Saloon League in the no-license campaign that is soon to begin in the state.

The local no-license committee proposed to make a vigorous fight against liquor license at the November election. The committee thus early expects support from those applicants for liquor licenses whose applications were rejected and by others who are opposed to liquor dealers for personal reasons.
