Direct Steal of State's Money

Direct Steal of State's Money. OSBORNE SO CHARACTERIZED ROAD CONTRACTS. WORK FOR GRAND JURY.

Orders Testimony Taken at Investigation to Be Turned Over to District Attorney—Costly Repair Work. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 28.—Commissioner James W. Osborne orders the testimony which was taken before him today, concerning highway repair work in Monticello, to be referred to the district attorney of that county, with a request for grand jury action. The work was performed by the Mohonk Construction company of Amsterdam, of which Peter V. Baird, described as a friend of Joseph J. Murphy, retired a member of the state bar, is president.

Mr. Osborne characterized the grand larceny in the manner in which the contract was obtained and the work performed. He also expressed the opinion that the highway contracts in that county were controlled by "a political clique" consisting of former Senator William C. Bullitt, secretary of the County Chamber of Commerce and County Chairman Wemple of that county and Joe Murphy of Troy.

"Work Absolutely Worthless." The road was a four mile stretch between Canaan and Sharon Springs. Built in 1902 at a cost of \$25,000, it was re-surfaced in 1912 at a cost of approximately \$24,000. In addition to this, a supplemental grand plan had been drawn, but never signed, which would have brought the road up to \$37,000. A. S. Mirick, a highway contractor, who testified today that the price paid was \$13,750 in excess of a proper contract, which would have allowed the contractor a 10 per cent profit.

Not only was the price paid a direct steal of state money, declared Mr. Osborne, "but the testimony before me today tends to show that the work was absolutely worthless. One of the witnesses, Alvin C. Bullitt, secretary of the board of trade of Canaan, testified that it had blown away in a gale, causing a loss of \$24,000. He testified that the public works commission of that vicinity appealed repeatedly to the highway department and to Governor Bunsell for approval of the contract. There was no answer."

318 Similar Contracts. The contract for the road was one of the 318 approved by the Bunsell-Edwards highway commission after the First Deputy "Pole" had been completed before the commission had been organized. "District Attorney Alexander has requested me to learn additional facts about those 318 contracts so awarded," Mr. Osborne declared. "He wanted to find out if the highway approval by Bunsell, Peck and Reel was not merely a technicality."

Joseph C. Curran, an investigator in the employ of the highway department, who assisted John A. Hennessy in his highway graft inquiries, testified concerning the highway department. He had taken 23 samples of the material used in various sections. Not one conformed with the specifications. Crushed stone was used, and the material through a two and a half inch screen was specified, but Curran's exhibits all were much larger, one being nearly eight inches in diameter. The contract called for imported stone, but the witness said Mr. Baird had used the stone from his own quarry, less than a mile from the road.
