YALE'S BOWL COSTS \$400,000. It Will Seat 20,000 More People Than Harvard's Stadium.

The recent appeal made to the graduates for more funds for the Bowl has brought to mind the great expense of the new structure at Yale field.

The first contract for the Bowl was granted in July, 1913, to the Sperry Engineering company, for \$178,000. It was necessary to make some additions to this contract and last December the committee of the executive board of the committee of twenty-one went over the matter with the contractor and signed the amended contract for \$278,000. Some extras outside of this sum have been suggested by the progress of the work, but it is expected that with the exception of the seats, this will complete the bowl. No careful figures can be given for the seating, but the engineer's estimate is about \$100,000. This will bring the total cost of the Bowl to about the original estimate of \$400,000.

The total cost of the Harvard stadium including the colonnade at the top, was approximately \$350,000. The \$50,000 difference between that and the bowl is more than the cost of the seating capacity. About 40,000 people witnessed the Yale-Harvard football game in Cambridge last fall, but the Bowl will seat 61,000 which can be increased by standing room.

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YALE'S NEW PLANS FOR ROWING

Announced by Richard Armstrong, Who has Charge of the Crews—Quite A Change In The Stroke—Yale Will Enter In The Triangular Race With Cornell And Princeton In Addition To The Race With Harvard.

New Haven, Conn., Feb. 15.—Definite plans of the Yale rowing coaches were announced for the first time tonight by Richard Armstrong, '28, graduate advisor in charge of the Blue crew, after conferring today with Guy Nickalls and Eugene Giannini, assistant coaches. Nickalls reached New Haven Saturday night.

Mr. Nickalls and Mr. Giannini will do all the active coaching, said Armstrong. "In the past the graduate advisor has done the actual coaching. However, we will all be in constant touch with one another.

The stroke which we have decided upon is a decided modification of the long body swing as used by Harcourt Gold last season. The new stroke will depend more on the slides for its power.

The recovery will be started by setting the feet from the body quickly, the body being held in an upright position. The hands come over gradually. The oarsman finishes his stroke in a natural, easy position.

The shortening of the sweep is a distinct change from the so-called pure English stroke used last year by Yale. American center rigging will be used on the shunt oars.

"This will necessitate bringing in the outriggers. We have ordered some new outriggers and are now negotiating for two new shells."

In addition to the Harvard race with Cornell and Princeton on May 23, Armstrong said Yale will enter a crew, probably the freshman crew, at the American Henley on May 15.
