MISTAKE IN BOTTLES.

Robert Langlois Took Fatal Dose of Wood Alcohol for Remedy—Leaves Twelve Children.

Albert Langlois of 141 Crescent Street, died Monday morning at St. Joseph's hospital as a result of taking wood alcohol by mistake. Dr. L. Mason, the medical examiner, stated that there was no question in his mind as to the occurrence was caused by mistake in bottles, as Mr. Langlois, whom all he could learn, was in a happy frame of mind and only suffering from a slight indisposition in the morning when the alcohol was taken.

Mr. Langlois complained of not feeling well Monday morning, and went to take a dose of alcohol and water, which he occasionally took when in bad condition. The first known of a serious illness was when his wife went upstairs after their children had left for school. Mr. Langlois then said he felt poorly and asked for a glass of water, which was brought to him. His condition became worse, however, and Dr. C. H. Girard was summoned. In reply to the doctor's questions, Mr. Girard stated that he had taken something from the wrong bottle. Then he became unconscious. The ambulance was sent for and the patient taken to St. Joseph's hospital, but his condition was critical and his death

occurred a few minutes after his arrival at the institution. The deceased, who was 45 years old, leaves his wife and twelve children. He had been a resident of this city about three years, during which he was employed by O. E. Bossette in his jewelry store on Main street. For the past year he had been doing work at his own home, where he had a small shop. He came to Willimantic from Moosup.

OBITUARY.

James Sullivan.

James Sullivan, 35, a native of Mansfield, who lived many years in this city, died in Meriden early Monday morning. The body was brought to this city the same day for burial. He attended St. Joseph's school and the Windham High school in Willimantic and was employed after his graduation in 1897 at the Morrison Machine company and afterwards by the Willimantic Machine company. He enlisted as a member of Co. E, Third Connecticut volunteers, at the outbreak of the Spanish war, and retained his membership in the organization after the war. When the company was transferred to the First regiment and took its present name, Co. L, Mr. Sullivan was promoted to be a commissioned officer, and later became first lieutenant. During the latter years of his life he was employed as a railway mail clerk.

Those survive the deceased one brother, Michael J. Sullivan of New Britain, and one sister, Miss Mary Sullivan of this city.
