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FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

AN UNCERTAIN COURSE. Briak Advance at Opening Checked by Weakness of Coalers.

New York, March 9.—The stock market pursued an uncertain course today, and closed with the level of yesterday. Little change in trading shifted their position frequently and speculative sentiment was confused.

London said Annapolis, Steel Canadian Pacific and Union Pacific were early in the day, putting out perhaps 15,000 shares. This selling, together with the lower quotations caused from abroad, caused some irregularity at the opening. It was apparent, however, that liquidation of various stocks such as upset the market last week had been suspended, a fact which encouraged speculative buying.

The market advanced briskly until weakness developed in the coalers. Lehigh Valley and Reading, in particular, were subjected to pressure, and under their lead the general list fell to below Saturday's close. If the late session the market hardened.

The improvement in tone of the market, by comparison with the unsettled settlement of last week, was influenced by the bullish statistics for returns of the day. The copper producers' statement showing a decrease in stocks of nearly 9,000,000 pounds, was considerably stronger than had been looked for. Domestic deliveries in February made only a slight improvement, but exports continued heavy gains in commercial activity was indicated by the fortnightly freight car report, showing a sharp contraction in surplus stock.

Some of the weak features of the market recently made further losses. Rock Island bonds sold down to new low prices. The collaterals, at the day's low point of 41, showed a loss of one; the refunding 4s at 74 1/2-5, a loss of 2 1/4 and the debenture 7s at 89 1/2-2, a decline of 4 1/2. Chesapeake and Ohio fell off sharply at the close, dipping under 52. United States express rose nearly 11 points, reaching 80 1/2-2, as compared with 48 in January and 54 less than two weeks ago.

Shafer signed a two year contract with the Giants last year, said Mr. Hempstead, "so he can have no salary grievance. In the event Shafer cannot be made to change his mind, the club has a good third base prospect in Milton Stock, a young infielder of whom McGraw thinks highly."

Hempstead received a telegram from McGraw today saying he had started for Marlin, instead of going to Chicago to attend the dinner to be given on the return of the tourists in that city tomorrow night. When McGraw left here he told Hempstead he would go to Chicago with Doyle, Moriello, Whitte, Thorpe and Hearn. It is believed that the McGraw infield problem was the cause of McGraw making this sudden change in his plans.

CUBS' PROSPECTIVE BUYER. John T. Connerly Expects to Acquire the Controlling Stock.

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
This was announced today by Connerly upon his return from New York. Connerly said he would soon form a stock company to deal with the control of the club, but that he would be the club president.


