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\$2,000 FOR MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

In Claim Made by Robert G. Mattison in Suit on Trial in Superior Court—Defendant is A. H. Christensen of Chester—Several Other Suits Settled.

The superior court held only a short session in New London on Wednesday morning, but moved again with the trial of the case of Robert G. Mattison of New London against A. H. Christensen of Chester to recover damages for personal injuries and for damage to a motor cycle.

LEGAL NOTICES

ATTENTION SIDEWALKS

Office of the Street Commissioner, Norwich, Jan. 8, 1914.

The ordinance of the City of Norwich, previous to the winter of 1913, occupied or occupants, private corporations, or any person leaving care of any building or lot of land, bordering on any street, square, or public place within the city, where there is a sidewalk graded or graded and paved, shall cause to be removed therefrom any snow, ice, or other material within three hours after the same shall have been deposited or laid, or within three hours after sunrise when the same shall have been deposited or laid, and that whenever the sidewalk or any part thereof, adjoining any building or lot of land, or any street, square, or public place, shall be covered with snow, ice, or other material, the owner of such building, or occupants, private corporations, or any person leaving care of such building or lot, shall cause such sidewalk to be kept clear of such material by removing the ice therefrom, or covering the same with sand or some other substance.

The ordinance also provide that in case of any violation of any of the foregoing provisions, the party violating shall pay a penalty of five dollars for every four hours of neglect, after notice from a policeman of the city. The ordinance also make it the duty of the Street Commissioner to collect all penalties incurred under the foregoing provisions, and if they are not paid to him on demand, to report the case to the City Attorney, who shall prosecute the party offending.
