WINE BARREL CRUSHED HIS HAND

New London Man Brings \$2000 Suit For Damages—Responded to Invitation to Help Get Barrel Down Cellar Steps—Two Suits For Divorce Filed For Superior Court.

For injuries that he claims to have received while helping to roll a large barrel of wine into a cellar in New London on Feb. 18, 1914, Antonio Di Noto has brought suit for \$2,000 damages against Nicolo Samaturo and Frank Piscatello, both of New London, and the legal papers, drawn by Clayton B. Smith, have been filed with the clerk of the superior court.

There has been a previous suit brought for trial in the superior court, and still undecided, in which Mrs. Cronberry sues her husband for \$1,000 on the common counts.

Another divorce suit in which the papers have been filed with the clerk of the superior court is brought by Caroline L. Vars against George W. Vars of Groton, who she says was married on July 17, 1902. The plaintiff asks to have her name changed to Caroline L. Mellow and she alleges adultery committed by her husband at New London and other places since January 1, 1908.
