KILLIFER JUMPED FEDS

CONTRACT FOR \$666 President Gilmore Makes the Figure Public.

The difference of \$666 and the breaking of the Federal League contract led to the first decisive legal fight between organized baseball and the new league.

their lower ones highly polished, are set in the front glass. The effect of the arrangement is to prevent the light from being thrown upward and to reduce the light thrown in the eyes of a person facing the lamp to such an extent that at anything less than 100 yards distant the blinding glare becomes softened to a harmless glow.

Devices of this kind, however, are unusually expensive. Something is required which will minimize the glare produced at a small cost. The motor-driven agency may be sufficiently low in price to bring it within the reach of every motor car user.

In the mean time there is one direction in which the glare nuisance can effectively be checked by legislation, and that is in the use of headlights in cities. There is no mischief whatever for this idle and mischievous practice, it is not attended by the same dangers as in the country, but it causes nearly as much discomfort.
