There is complaint this spring among poultry raisers that chickens are not hatching well. In some cases the hens set for a few days and leave the nest, and the eggs get chilled and are spoiled. Several have lost the chickens after they were hatched.

The postoffice department has barred all prayer chain letters from the mails. The order is issued by the federal authorities under that section of the law which gives them the right to bar from the mails any postal matter which contains an implied threat.

During the past six months the savings banks of the state have made a total gain in deposits of \$5,358,249.49, according to a statement made Saturday by Bank Commissioners Holt and Lippitt. These figures prove that business in Connecticut is good and prosperity abundant.
