HONORS SOLDIER DEAD

Memorial Day—Absence of Adj. Paul H. Hill increases Sense of Sadness and Loss—Town Selected for Road Investigation—Mrs. Mary Northrup, Dead at 99, Leaves 37 Great-Grandchildren.

Memorial day was observed under the auspices of Building and Hancock streets, G. A. R., the fact being demonstrated that there is a rapid decrease in the number of veterans. In the exercises two Grand Army posts participated, the one in the department of Rhode Island and the other in the department of Connecticut, both having quarters in the Memorial building, yet when all were assembled for parade only 30 reported as fit for the duty, and a large proportion of them were unable to fill in for the march and went over the route in automobiles. With Colonel Everett E. Whipple and Major Arthur N. Nash as marshals, Spanish American War Veterans, the line was formed in Broad street, and headed by the Westerly band, and under escort of the Fifth company, R. I. N. G., and Western Boy Scouts, the Boys of 11, the old men of 1714, proceeded to St. Michael's and River Bend cemeteries and performed the customary ceremonial ceremony of depositing flowers on the departed comrades, the graves of which were marked with the flag and a pointed plant.

All stores and places of business were closed during the afternoon and nearly all closed for the whole day. Flags were generously displayed and the whole people entered into the solemnity and importance of the patriotic anniversary.

In the evening the town hall was filled in attendance for the following memorial day exercises when the following programme was rendered:

The reading of the obituary was particularly impressive by reason of the absence of Adjutant Paul H. Hill, who had for years prepared the obituary and read them at the annual Memorial service, and the fact that this was the first time in the history of all assembled when this section of the programme was reached.

William Pryor, a machinist, age 65, died Friday in the Rhode Island state hospital after a long illness. He was married 26 years ago. He leaves his widow and a son, Charles Pryor.

John Howard, son of Thomas F. Howard, was graduated with honors last Thursday from the New York College of Dental and Oral Surgery, and returned to Westerly Saturday afternoon.

Major Arthur N. Nash of Westerly, commander of the first battalion and Major Bourdon A. Babcock, also of Westerly, the second battalion of the First Artillery, arrived in Rhode Island National guard in the Memorial day parade in Providence Saturday morning.

Mrs. Sully's Suit Against Tiffany & Co. to Reach Jury at Last.
By a decision handed down by the appellate division of the New York supreme court Mrs. Emma F. Sully of Watch Hill is to have a chance to have her complaint against Tiffany & Co. heard in the supreme court. The higher court criticized the long delay that has occurred in this case. Mrs. Sully says she gave Tiffany & Co. \$125,000 worth of jewelry to keep for her and that she has not been able to recover it. She began suit for the recovery of the jewels in 1906, but the case never got to trial. The decision of the appellate division was written by Justice Laughlin, and says in part: "The trial of this issue in this case has been unreasonably delayed by applications to the court in a variety of forms, and by appeals on questions involving the merits. It is a long time that the dilatory tactics of the parties should cease, and that the parties should present the merits of their litigation for decision."
