PLAN FOR PACIFICATION OF MEXICO

Presented by Representatives of the United States to the Three South American Mediators

PROVIDES FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF GOVERNMENT

Of Provisional Nature, Which Would Conduct General Elections for a Permanent Government—Said to Differ but Slightly from Plan Advocated by Huerta's Agents—Full Conference of All Delegates and Mediators to be Held Today or Tomorrow to Consider Final Drafting of Protocol.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 8.—The United States government, through Justice Lamar and Frederick W. Lehmann, today presented to the three South American mediators a complete plan for the pacification of Mexico. It is the same in principle as that proposed by the mediators and already agreed to by the Huerta government. It contemplates establishment at the earliest date practicable of a new provisional government in Mexico City, which would conduct general elections for a permanent government.

The plan written by the American delegates, after consultation with the Washington government is brief and includes several counter propositions of which the Huerta delegates were advised tomorrow. From the mediators themselves it became known that the differences of opinion were slight. A full conference of all delegates and mediators is planned for tomorrow or Wednesday. This is for the formal consideration and final drafting of the protocol.

HOPE ANTIILAS' CARGO WILL BE RETURNED TO NEW YORK.

Although the question of whether the Antilla would be permitted to land her ammunition at the constitutional port of Tampico was not finally decided today, the American delegates let it be known that while they hoped the cargo in some way would be returned to New York, they were not disposed to interrupt mediation even if the ammunition finally got ashore. General Huerta's order rescinding the blockade infused a spirit of optimism everywhere for the situation yesterday.

Believe Carranza Has Had Time Enough.

It is understood that the mediators feel they have allowed enough time for General Carranza to make reply to the note which they despatched last Tuesday to inform his constitutionalist representative in Washington. With the making public of the correspondence which has passed between the mediators and General Carranza, including part of that from Washington, the mediators believe Carranza has had time enough.

Washington Already Had Decided an Embargo Both by Land and Sea Against the Antilla.

Washington already had decided an embargo both by land and sea against the Antilla, and the United States to Mexico, so that cases similar to the Antilla cannot arise again, even though the American government finds it impossible to dissuade the ship owners from landing the cargo.

Washington Officials Express Satisfaction at Huerta's Action—Mediators Announce That They Will Make Public Today all Correspondence That Has Passed Between Them and Carranza or His Agents—Representatives of Rebel Chieftain Expect to Hear From Their Leader at Saltillo Today.

Washington, June 8.—General Huerta's order today suspending the order to blockade Tampico and the delivery of ammunition by the steamers which had been ordered to be served to dispel apprehension over a new crisis between the United States and the Huerta government which had threatened mediation of Mexican affairs.

MOUNT LASSEN SPOUTS

Steam 700 Feet High. Believed to be Due to Melted Snow Running into Tissues.

Red Bluffs, Calif., June 8.—Late tonight a column of steam seven hundred feet high shot out of Mount Lassen, which has been dormant since the mountain emitted fire.

FEDERAL GUNBOATS RETURN TO PUERTO MEXICO

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The general belief here regarding mediation is that the outlook is more hopeful in view of Huerta's present attitude and there are many who believe that the blockade will be lifted. The recent note of the South American mediating envoys will pave the way for his decision.

Some department officials tonight, in discussing the situation affecting the Antilla, argued that, despite the fact that the Cuban flag, her American owners still were amenable to American customs and shipping laws, and that there was every reason to believe that the company would be prepared to give respectful consideration to hints from the state department that it would prefer to not land ammunition at Tampico.

Chicago, June 8.—William Rapp's defence against the divorce suit of his wife, Mrs. Ernestine Schumann-Heink, ceased suddenly after four witnesses and the case was given to the attorneys for argument.

Owing to the fact that Rapp filed a cross-bill charging his wife with a statutory offense, a large crowd packed the courtroom for the hearing on the testimony bearing on the counter-allegations. They were disappointed.

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THAW'S FIGHT FOR FREEDOM

HAS REACHED SUPREME COURT. Representatives of New York Given Until Friday to File Brief in Opposition.

Washington, June 8.—Harry K. Thaw's fight for freedom reached the supreme court of the United States today when former Governor Stone of New York, as counsel, asked for his release on bail, pending a final decision of the proceedings by which the state of New York seeks to return the noted prisoner to Matteawan from his refuge in New Hampshire.

Gunboats Leave Tampico.

Secretary Bryan was first informed of Huerta's suspension of the blockade by Mr. Riano, the Spanish minister. The secretary declined to discuss the matter and the suspension of the blockade order at the request of the South American mediators, pending settlement of questions relating to the cessation of hostilities during the progress of the peace conference.

The Mexican gunboats Zaragoza and Bravo, followed by the American gunboats Tacoma and Sacramento, reached Tampico today. The American gunboats were put up to Secretary Bryan from Niagara Falls and Huerta was asked to suspend the blockade of Tampico.
