

Important Changes in Olympic Rules

United States Scored a Victory at International Amateur Athletic Federation Congress

Atletic Federation Congress by Adoption of Flush Take-off in Broad Jump—All Members of the Rules Committee Were Re-elected.

Lyons, France, June 11.—An unexpected proposal from Finland at the final session of the international amateur athletic federation congress today brought a victory to the United States.

Another important change from the rules passed by the committee was the return to the eight feet, two inch circle for the discus, which also was proposed by Finland.

A proposal by England that coaches and turning on the rope be permitted in the tug-of-war was rejected.

On all other points the congress was unanimous in ratifying the committee's suggestions, except in regard to the javelin, for which the Finnish specifications were accepted.

The congress closed by accepting an invitation from Copenhagen, general secretary of the Olympic games to be held in Berlin, that the next meeting of the federation be held in Copenhagen.

All the members of the rules committee were re-elected and empowered to deal with all questions concerning rule-making before the next congress.

A Russian delegate was present at today's meeting and Holland sent an appeal for membership in the federation.

The chief feature of the congress was the absolute good fellowship prevailing and the absence of any friction between the representatives of the various nations.
