THE KALEIDOSCOPE. Less oil is produced every year in Baku, Russia. In 1912 there were in use in this country 8,729,592 telephones. Montana and Idaho have a nine-hour day for working women. Russia will dispossess 20,000 peasants in the province of Georgia. The second congress of Spanish trade unions will begin on June 29 in Madrid. Peter the Great made the Russian flag. He liked the Dutch so much that he just turned their colors around. The former site of the United States Mint in Philadelphia sold for \$31,000 in 1890; now it is assessed for \$3,100,000. The longest plant in the world is said to be a species of sub-tropical seaweed which grows sometimes 600 feet in length. Japan, although a great rice growing country, imported from abroad last year more than \$16,000,000 worth of this cereal. The Business Men's league of St. Louis has made a statement of \$5,000,000 fund for the St. Louis Symphony orchestra. Of the French troops in North Africa in 1912 only one in five thousand of those inoculated with anti-typhoid serum contracted the disease. There are two opera houses in Antwerp, Belgium, subsidized by the municipality. One produces opera in French, the other in Flemish and German. County Treasurer Guillian, of Auburn, Neb., received a request from a Maywood man for a statement of his personal taxes for 1882, because his conscience was troubling him. Miss Martha Suddath, of Columbia, Mo., was married recently, with a ring which had been used by eight of her maternal ancestors, beginning with her great-great-grandmother. Tinplate imports into the United States fell from 186,000,000 pounds in 1902 to 4,500,000 pounds in 1912, while the quantity exported increased from 3,500,000 pounds in 1902 to 182,000,000 pounds in 1902. Wheat and wheat-flour consumption annually per inhabitant is estimated at 202.7 pounds in Germany, 580 pounds in France, and 456.7 pounds in the United States. German consumption of rye flour is about as much as that of wheat flour.
