

CHAUFFEUR'S COLLAR BONE BROKEN

Fred Gauthier Pinned Under Steering Wheel When Machine Turned Turtle in Street in Baltic—Auto Crowded Off Into Gutter—Passing Machine Turned in too Close Ahead.

When the seven passenger touring car owned by Angus Park and operated by Fred Gauthier, Mr. Park's chauffeur, turned turtle on Main street, near Mill street, Baltic, Friday afternoon about 4 o'clock, Mr. Gauthier was pinned beneath the steering wheel, receiving a broken collar bone as the result.

Mr. Ernst, who was sitting in the seat in the machine to the left of Gauthier, was also thrown under the car as it turned over to the right, but was not caught and held so tight that he was able to crawl out and then lift the machine a little so as to drag the unconscious Gauthier out.

While driving up Main street, Baltic, another car came up behind him and for several hundred feet the two cars were driven side by side. To avoid a collision Mr. Gauthier started to turn out to the right hand side of the road so as to let the other car which was driven by Walter Miner of Baltic, pass on in safety.

BUBONIC PLAGUE COSTLY FOR NEW ORLEANS.

Will Require Six Months to Stamp Out Contagion—\$25,000 Per Month. New Orleans, La., July 1.—The cost of the campaign for the eradication of bubonic plague here will be from \$20,000 to \$25,000 a month, and six months will be required to stamp out the contagion, according to Dr. Rupert Blue, surgeon general of the United States public health and marine hospital service, who today received authorization from Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo to take charge of the work. Dr. Blue says the situation here is not alarming.
