A WARNING FOR CHINA

British Foreign Secretary Says Tibetan Question Must Be Settled.

London, July 10.—A warning that trouble may come because of China's refusal to sign the convention in regard to what territory shall compose outer and inner Tibet reached by the recent convention at Darjeeling, India, was issued to China today by Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary. Sir Edward was speaking on the subject of the appropriations for the Foreign Office in the House of Commons, and said: "If China does not sign, but resorts to an aggressive policy, the consequences must be disastrous for China. There certainly will be grave trouble on the India frontier, which will require Great Britain to take up the matter seriously with the government of China."
