AUTO DRIVERS GIVE TESTIMONY

In Hearings at State Secretary's Office—F. A. Gauthier and W. J. Milner Tell of Accident at Baltic—Arthur Chapman of Colchester Answers Charge of Running With Muffler Open.

In the office of the secretary of state on Tuesday afternoon, Deputy Secretary Richard J. Dwyer conducted several hearings relating to complaints and violation of automobile laws of the state. Walter J. Milner of Baltic and Fred A. Gauthier of Norwich were before the deputy secretary on complaint of reckless driving and racing on July 3 at Baltic. Their machines were passing on Mill street in Baltic with the muffler deliberately removed and were forced into the ditch, it was claimed, and automobile turned over. Gauthier was pinned down and had his collar bone broken. Otto Ernst who was riding with him escaped without injury. Gauthier, who is chauffeur for Angus Park of Hanover, gave testimony that Milner deliberately shot in ahead of him and that Milner drove so close that the only thing for Gauthier to do was to go into the ditch. He accused Milner of going on ahead without stopping and of trying to evade responsibility when he came back to the scene by denying that he was the driver.

Stricken With Shock at His Farm in North Stonington. While he was out to milk on Wednesday morning at his farm in North Stonington, about a mile east of Preston City, Courtland R. Swan was seized with a shock and at about 10 o'clock members of his family found him lying dead in the barnyard with his milk pail on his arm. Medical Examiner Lewis thought that death was due to a shock and Henry Allen & Son were given permission to remove the body. Mr. Swan was 75 years of age and had been enjoying excellent health. Mr. Swan was a North Stonington man, born and bred, and all his life he passed within that town. His father, Denison Swan, was one of the founders of the town of Stonington in the historic bombardment of 1814 and his mother was Caroline Bailey Swan. They too, were natives of North Stonington.

MONTHLY STATISTICS OF EMPLOYMENT BUREAU. Norwich Had 61 Applications of Situations Were Secured. Hartford, Conn., Aug. 12.—During the month of July 87.4 per cent. of all the applicants for employment at the free employment bureau in the state were supplied with situations, as against 89.7 per cent. in June, according to the monthly report made today. Of the total number applying, 78.3 per cent. were furnished with help against 82.7 per cent. during June. Hartford had 247 applications for employment, 152 applications for help and supplied 94 situations. In New Haven there were 320 applications for employment, 192 for help and 124 situations were secured. Bridgeport had 881 applications for employment, 280 for help, and supplied 234 situations. Waterbury had 568 applications for employment, 102 for help and 144 situations were secured for 87. In Norwich there were 61 applications for employment, 19 for help and 27 situations were secured.
